Between about 55 and 25 million years ago, rhinoceroses were among the most dominant hoofed mammals. Today, there are only five surviving species and all are on the verge of extinction. One of these is the African black rhino, whose scientific name *Diceros bicornis* means two-horned.

The black rhino has thick, hairless, grey skin. It can grow to a length of 3.8 metres, 5 a height of 1.7 metres and a weight of 1800 kilograms. Only its front horn can grow up to 1.3 metres. The rhino's upper lip is pointed or hooked in contrast to the white rhino, which has a square lip. The rhino has very poor eyesight but good hearing. It has a great sense of smell too, and it uses this to detect its very few predators and other rhinos.

The black rhino lives in small pockets of eastern and southern Africa in grasslands 10 and woodlands. Each rhino lives in an area of its own called its home range. Some females share part of their home range but males keep clear boundaries between theirs. Rhinos mark out their land by spraying urine on paths and borders, scraping over sites with their legs and horns, and using regular dung heaps.

The International Rhino Foundation calls the endangerment of all rhinos 'a crisis 15 of catastrophic proportions for such a venerable group of animals'. They predict that without drastic action, four species of rhino could be extinct in the wild within the next 10 years. The black rhino has suffered the most spectacular decline with populations reduced by 85% in the last 10 to 15 years. The main problem is people poaching for horns to use in eastern medicines or as decorative handles for ceremonial daggers. 20

There have been intense anti-poaching efforts over the last years and this had led to a stabilisation of the population at about 2400. In Zimbabwe, for example, armed rangers defend game parks. In Namibia, conservationists dehorn rhinos in a simple, painless operation so they will be valueless. Protected sanctuaries in Kenya have 25 allowed the species to increase there by 5% each year. International captive breeding programmes such as the one at the Western plains Zoo in Dubbo, New South Wales, have also contributed. While the results of conservation programmes have been encouraging, poaching remains a very real threat to the survival of the magnificent black rhino.

Section K: Comprehension Open-Ended (10 x 2 marks)

The small, well-equipped classroom in Karachi is filled with colour and life. A group of four-year-olds, dressed in matching green uniforms, listens attentively as a young teacher gives a lesson on shapes. When she asks a question, hands shoot in the air.

Welcome to The Garage School (TGS). As the name suggests, it resides in the garage of a bungalow, located in the upmarket residential area of Clifton. However, none of the students is wealthy. They come from the nearby slums of Shah Rasool Colony and Neelum Colony. If not for the free education provided by TGS, most of these kids would probably end up as child labourers.

TGS was born out of tragedy. In 1971, Shabina Mustafa was widowed at the age of 20. For the next 32 years, she worked as a reservation agent at Saudi Arabian Airlines and raised her son, Syed Zain Mustafa. However, she never forgot the dream of her late husband, Syed Safi Mustafa, who often talked about opening a school for underprivileged students one day. Finally the opportunity presented itself in November 1999 when Sobia Riyasat, the daughter of Shabina's maid, was refused admission to a sewing school because she could not read or write.

Shabina took on the job and decided to teach Sobia herself. Working in her spare time, Shabina began teaching the 11-year-old Sobia in a space set up in her garage. Word about the new school spread among the parents in Sobia's neighbourhood. Initially Shabina worked alone, but later when the number of students grew to 40, she asked teachers she knew to volunteer their time at the school.

A key to the school's success is Shabina's gift for bringing people together. "In the initial days, Ghazala Nizami, principal of Happy Home School, sent me all the used leftover pencils, exercise books with few unused pages and tiffin boxes. Other schools also sent us newspapers which we sold to buy erasers and pencils," Shabina says. "When people see that someone is genuinely helping the society, they try to be a part of it too."

TGS's mission is to provide a useful education to the under-privileged children in and around the Clifton area. When Abbas Vawda, a friend of Shabina visiting from the UK, heard about this, he began to sponsor ten children annually so they could move into the regular school system. "Now we have a programme in place where anyone can sponsor a child or a teacher and pay for the medical expenses or uniforms, whatever one can afford to do," Shabina says.

Education is now only part of the picture. All students are sent for health and dental checkups. Shabina's older brother, Athar Ahmed, started a milk and biscuits programme so the students do not study on empty stomachs. TGS also offers informal training for older students and adults in subjects such as English and Financial Management.
