Our attention was suddenly attracted by the appearance of a triangular fin above the water, just a few yards away from us. Peterkin shouted to us to paddle in that direction, as he thought it was a big fish, and we might have a chance of catching it. Hardly had he finished speaking when a shark appeared.

But we all made a great commotion with our paddles which no doubt frightened it away for a short time, but we saw it once again circling round us, just as before.

"Throw the fish to him!" cried Jack, in a quick, suppressed voice. "We'll make it to shore in time if we can keep him off for a few minutes."

Peterkin stopped one instant to obey the command, and then used his paddle again with all his might. No sooner had the fish fallen than we saw the shark sink. In another second, we saw its white breast rising; for sharks always turn on their sides when about to seize their prey, their mouths being not at the point of their heads like those of other fish, but under their chins.
