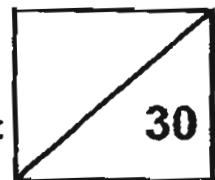

My father's dilapidated bungalow was situated among the rubber estates about nine kilometers from the town. It has a large compound where new chickens could roam to scratch for worms and hunt for insects. I kept chickens as pets and loved to watch a mother hen surrounded by a dozen fluffy chicks responding to her clucking whenever she scratched around and found a juicy worm or insect for them. Any observer will learn to recognize the varying calls of a hen to her chicks: the warning of danger of a hawk overhead which sends the chick scampering into the grass to hide; the inviting "cluck-cluck" to share a delicious morsel; or an angry warning with fluffed up feathers to dissuade wooing roosters.

It was exciting too, watching chicks pecking their way out of the eggs from under their brooding mother on the twenty-first day. Occasionally, I was able to help a damp, weaker chick out of its shell. Mother hens are very protective of their young and keep them warm under their wings at night.

I made a special pet of a young cockerel who grew into a big bird. He was very bright and splendid in his appearance. His red and gold feathers coloured like a rainbow, shimmering with changing colours in the sun. He knew me well and used to follow me around. I could pick him up and carry him about. He loved to feed from my hand. Unfortunately, he got into the habit of ambushing the women in the house, often pecking their legs.

He was a naturally aggressive rooster and so the women disliked him. They complained frequently and even displayed the reddish-blue marks made by his beak on their legs. I paid no attention to their protests. What else could I do? There was no way I could train the bird to refrain from attacking women; curiously enough he ignored the men. He must have been a misogynist who disliked women! But the poor fellow paid clearly for his pranks.

Almost immediately, I was stunned by the view on my left. A huge rhino charged through the trees on a course aimed to collide with ours. There was no chance to back off, no hope of accelerating out of trouble. Ahmad, in the passenger seat, could not react in time to shoot the rhino before the earth-glazed female struck the jeep, which she far outweighed. Angry, Ahmad cursed, regretting it. His door caved in and crushed his rifle.

"Remember the rule for Kaziranga!" Konwar bellowed. I heard him. However, I was breaking it. Ahmad tried to stab the rhino with a dagger but was stopped by Konwar. I realized the rhino was shoving us towards the road's edge and butting our jeep up onto two wheels. Then, the female's teeth were gouging deep grooves into the jeep's steel.
