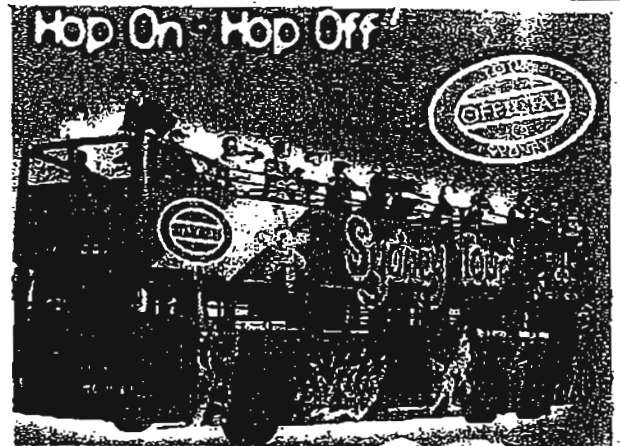

I have just turned fifteen. I am what society calls a 'troubled teen'. I have been in and out of the juvenile court eleven times. I have been in five different homes.

When did my life fall apart? Maybe it was doomed from the beginning but it seemed to me that life changed the day my mother died. Everything went downhill for me from that day on. For one, I was so sad that I could not even function. I did not want to get out of bed, let alone go to school. Because of that, I was labelled a 'truant'. 5

I never knew my father. So when my mother died, I went to live with my sister. She was twenty-five and with a life of her own, she did not want a kid around. Realising that I was just in the way, I knew it would be better if I left. So one day, I did. My sister reported my disappearance to the police. The police found me and took me to a detention facility. There, I was labelled 'homeless'. 10

Then, the court sent me to a group home. I did not feel like I belonged there because the youths who were placed there had done bad things like stealing and using drugs. I had done neither of those. I have never committed any crime. The only thing I had done was 'leave' when I did not feel like I belonged. I do not consider myself a bad guy and I am fairly bright. In school, I even got good grades. More than anything else, I see myself as a boy without parents – and that is a problem. I believe that even if your relationship with your parents is rocky, at least you have a home. 15

Feeling that the group home was not for me, one day, I just slipped out. The police found me again and brought me back. This time, I was labelled a 'runaway'. I was brought back to the group home and I decided to stop running. I did not want any new label for each one carried a terrible penalty. 20

With good behaviour, I am supposed to be released in thirteen days. The even better news is that I have met my father and he has agreed to have me live with him. I really hope that my father and I become a real family. I am hoping my father will be someone who is going to let me have my feelings and not tell me to 'buck up and be a man' as I was told by the warden at the group home. I am still sad about my mother's death and I hope my father will allow me to talk about her. I hope he wants me in his life and that he does not feel that he is stuck with me as my sister had felt. 25

I am hoping for other things too. I am looking forward to going back to school and having friends. I hope the labels I have picked up and the places I have been will not keep me from having nice friends. So if you meet me or someone like me, please be open-minded and give me a chance to be a good friend. I would like you to keep in mind that not everyone with a past is a bad person. He could be just a person who has been down on his luck. 30 35

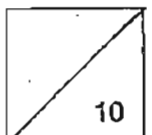

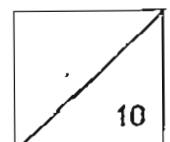

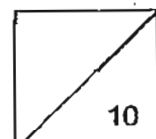

Susan Magdalene Boyle is a Scottish singer who gained instant fame after her superb audition in a television talent show competition, 'Britain's Got Talent'. Born in Blackburn, Scotland, to immigrant parents Patrick and Bridget Boyle, Susan became a worldwide sensation when video clips of the audition and her subsequent performances on the talent show were posted on the internet.

The youngest of four brothers and six sisters, Susan was born when her mother was 47. She was briefly deprived of oxygen during the difficult birth and was later diagnosed as having learning difficulties. She was bullied as a child and was nicknamed 'Susie Simple' at school. After leaving school with only a few qualifications, she was employed as a trainee cook for six months. That was the only job she had before becoming a singer.

Susan has always loved singing and is blessed with the voice of an angel. When she was younger, she took singing lessons from a voice coach. She sang in local choirs and performed at pubs in and around her village. In 1999, Susan used all her savings to pay for a professionally-cut demo. She sent copies of her demo CD to record companies, radio talent competitions and national television stations in the hope of being noticed as a professional singer. She also took part in singing competitions and did well enough to clinch the top prize in some. However, prior to her life-changing audition, she was seldom taken seriously as a singer as people were often turned-off by her plain appearance on stage. In fact, she was often ridiculed.

Susan was very close to her mother. When her father died and her siblings had gotten married, she dedicated herself to care for her ageing mother. After Susan won several local singing competitions, her mother urged her to enter 'Britain's Got Talent'. Her mother wanted her to take the risk of singing in front of an audience larger than the parish church which she was used to. Susan was apprehensive initially. She believed people were being chosen for their looks. She also thought she was too old for the competition.

In 2007, Susan's mother died at the age of 91. A neighbour reported that Susan was so devastated at her mother's death that she would not come out of her house for a few days or answer the telephone or the doorbell. After she got over the death of her mother, she was motivated to continue to seek a musical career to pay tribute to her beloved mother. She then decided to fulfil her mother's wish for her to enter the talent show.

When Susan first appeared in front of the judges and hundreds of people in the audience, they did not look impressed with the way she presented herself on stage. She hardly had any make-up on her face, her hair was dishevelled and her dress was frumpy. In fact, when she said that her dream was to be a professional

singer, the audience sniggered and shook their heads. Even the judges looked at her in disbelief. However, all that changed when she sang the first note of the song 'I 40
Dreamed a Dream'. Her powerful voice stunned both the judges and audience. At the end of her performance, she was given a standing ovation. One of the judges said, "Without a doubt, that was the biggest surprise I have had in three years of the show. That was an incredible performance." Another judge who had tears in her eyes said, "I honestly think we were being very cynical and that was the biggest wake-up call 45
ever."

Although Susan did not win the competition, she was placed the runner-up. Apart from being well-known globally, what she had gained the most was fulfilling her dream.

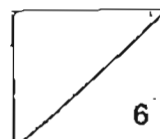

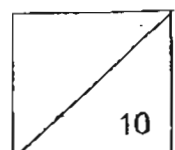

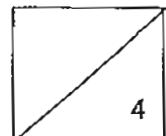
