





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Early in the morning, shortly after dawn, while Tito was still dreaming, Bimbo would disappear. Tito would curl up in the comer, looking almost like his canine friend and go to sleep, while Bimbo, looking quite important serving his master, would disappear again. In a half-hour, he would be back with their lunch. Sometimes it would be a piece of fruit or a scrap of meat. Often it was nothing but a dry crust. On some lucky days, there would be one of those flat, rich cakes, sprinkled with raisins and sugar, which Tito liked so much.

At suppertime, the same thing happened, although there was a little less of everything, for things were hard to snatch in the evening with the streets full of people. However, whether there was much or little, hot or cold, fresh or dry, food was always there. Tito never asked where it came from. There was plenty of rainwater in the hollows of soft stones and the egg woman gave him occasional cupfuls of strong goats' milk. In the grape season, the fat winemaker let him have drippings of the mild juice. So there was no real danger of going hungry or thirsty. There was plenty of everything in Pompeii if you knew where to find it – and if you had a companion like Bimbo.

One afternoon, Tito made his way to the forum, guided by Bimbo who was his eyes to the world. The forum was the part of town to which everybody came at least once during the day. Everything happened there. There were no private houses; all was public – the chief temples, the gold and red bazaars, the silk shops, the town hall, the booths belonging to the weavers and the jewel merchants, the wealthy woollen market. I know it is my fault and she is angry with me, for I do not give her enough even for her three meals a day. Please help me win much money, and then I shall take good care of her, and rent her a better room to live in."

And now Ah Boh became convinced that the day of fulfilment was not far away. "It will be soon," she kept murmuring to herself. "I know it. My dead husband has given me a sign." When she visited her old mother in the tiny, rented room in a dilapidated attap house, she spoke of coming wealth and happiness, but the old woman merely said sharply, "Enough of this foolish talk! How much money can you spare to support your old mother this month? But do not worry. I can take care of myself now. Take back your money and go and gamble with it!"

Sitting down in a nearby *kopitiam*, Ah Boh wept, but she was undaunted. She knew, with certainty, that luck was coming, for hadn't her dead husband given her a sign when she prayed before his ashes in the temple? In this frame of mind, she rushed out joyously when somebody told her of an accident a street away, carrying pencil and slip of paper. She arrived, gasping with excited joy, like a child about to receive a present. Untwisted, intact, calling upon Ah Boh to heed them, were the numbers on the plate. She was saying something, but it made no sense to the bystanders who merely stared at her or looked at her with pity, connecting her distractedness with the dead woman on the road. She was saying in frantic pleading, "You will not be angry with me. I will buy you the most expensive coffin with the prize money, and burn a hundred joss-sticks for you every day, and so you will not be angry with me."
