She recognized people by running her fingers over their faces. Soon afterwards, her father got her a teacher, Annie Sullivan. Annie was an industrious teacher. She put in a lot of effort to teach Helen. It was Annie's patience and hardwork that made Helen learn to read and speak. Annie made Helen rise to greater heights in life and to be admired by many.

The cold lands of the Arctic at the North Pole form one of the last wildernesses on Earth. There are still huge areas undisturbed by man over there.

At first sight, the Arctic looks like a cold desert! For the most part of the year, snow and ice cover the treeless landscape.

However, many plants and animals have managed to survive and even flourish: The plants, insects, birds and animals of the Arctic have all developed ways of adapting to the harsh environment.

There are no tall Arctic plants as the growing season is too short for them to grow much, and there is too little water. They grow close to the ground for protection against the icy winds and to suck up every drop of moisture in summer.

Arctic foxes have the ability to change their fur according to the seasons. In summer, their fur is brown while in winter, it becomes white. This enables Arctic foxes to blend into their surrounding throughout the year. It is not easy to spot a white Arctic fox against the blanket of snow.

The Arctic has still retained its natural charm and remains beautiful as it is yet to be touched by man.
