In the past, people camped out of need. Soldiers and travellers camped when there was no town nearby to spend the night. Over time, people began to camp for fun and to get away from their fast-paced lifestyles. Nature in its untouched beauty is stunning to observe. Many adventurers travel into the wilderness for days, or even weeks, at a time. Camping is also a great way to spend a family vacation.

Before a camping trip, you need to pack some essential items. A trail map and compass are useful tools for navigating. In addition, a lamp or flashlight helps you get around in the dark. A first aid kit is necessary in case of scrapes, insect bites or sunburns. You also need equipment for building a shelter, cooking and living outdoors. You may want to bring other items, such as a camera, a book and a pair of binoculars.

After a good night's sleep, waking up to a beautiful view is thrilling! Most people look for a good view when selecting their campsite. However, campers must also keep safety in mind. Tents should also be pitched away from tall trees because branches could fall and hurt someone. Once a spot has been selected, pitch the tent on high ground. If the campsite is sloped, pitch the tent uphill. If it rains, water will drain away from the tent.

A camping trip can be challenging depending on the factors involved. These include the length of the trip and the remoteness of the campsite. A long trip or a distant campsite requires campers to pack more equipment and food. Campers heading to remote sites will need to plan their route carefully. The hike to the campsite and difficulty of the hike also add challenges to the trip. The length of the hike, the amount of elevation, and the roughness of the ground are factors to consider. "A short, flat, smooth path is suited for beginners; a long, steep, rocky path is for experienced hikers," Greg Savos, an experienced camper, advises.

There are also many **potential dangers outdoors**. Even seasoned campers should be prepared for unexpected weather changes and be wary of insects and wild animals. "Although it is rare for wild animals to approach or attack people, they are attracted to food. So, keep all camp food locked in a vehicle until they are needed. If I can't find a good place to store my supplies, I'll hang them up on a distant tree," Savos suggests.

Camping is a wonderful opportunity to learn about our natural world. With an open trail at your feet and a fresh breeze at your back, what is better than exploring the great 30 outdoors?



Compost is a mixture that consists largely of decayed organic matter and is recycled into fertilising and conditioning land. There could not be a more environmentally friendly way of desposeing your kitchen and (43)garden waste to by using it to make compost. It will better enable your soil to reetane nutrients, (45)moisture and air. When the waste has been break down by micro-organisms, it can be used to: (46)increase soil fertile and improve its texture. To make your compost, use materials such as uncooked fruit and vegetable, kitchen waste as well as shredded paper and cardboard. Keep your compost moist even not soaking wet. This (48)may mean watering it in dry weather. Covering it up will also help in the mentainance of the moisture level and keep rain out. The heap of compost also requires air to circulate adlkuately. Turn or fork your compost regularly to speed up decomposition.

Leave it for about three months and your compost will be brown and crumbly, filled with a

fresh earthy odour. This makes a great supliment to your garden. Better still, it costs next to
