Ten years ago, the world was in a panic over a mysterious illness - SARS. The virus killed hundreds and infected thousands. However, its impact would have been far more devastating if a handful of doctors and nurses had not acted the way they did.

In 2003, Dr Olivier Cattin was working at the French hospital in Hanoi in North 5 Vietnam. "We got to the Friday of the week and there was only one nurse left on our ward who was able to treat the other nurses."

It was the end of February that year. A Chinese-American man, Johnny Chen, arrived with what appeared to be a bad flu.

In a matter of days, nearly 40 people at the hospital had fallen ill. Some nurses and doctors had fallen ill as well. Seven would go on to die. This was where the deadly disease known as Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome (SARS) first appeared.

It was highly contagious, quick to spread, and often deadly. More than 8,000 people around the world were infected. More than 770 died. However, this is a story about people, not statistics. When you know more about SARS and the people who battled it, you will be overwhelmed by the experiences and the heroism of those who stood on the frontline. We often use war to represent the fight against diseases. In the case of the fight against SARS, it was most accurate.

At the French hospital in Hanoi, panic set in as the doctors looked at the X-rays of all those who had fallen ill. They knew they were facing something very serious and 20 extremely unusual. The virus was highly unusual. It was most infectious when its victims were at their most unwell and usually in hospital care. This meant that nurses and doctors were usually the ones who were infected.

Because of this, the worst cases occurred in a few hospital wards and intensive care units in a handful of major cities. In these hospitals, the virus spread like **wildfire**. 25 When Johnny Chen and some of the first nurses and doctors to care for him all died, people were shocked. They began to understand what they were facing and the risk it posed to the world outside.

They knew all the risks and dangers. Then they took the incredible step of locking themselves in, away from the city to protect it and their country.

"I've never met such amazing doctors and nurses as I did in North Vietnam," says Cattin. "I lost five colleagues - they were friends. We're the survivors of this outbreak."

Salvatore smiled as he held the shoes up to the light. His sister would look lovely in church the next day. Then his eye caught a droplet of glue seeping out from between the cardboard sole and the piece of canvas he had used for the toe. He carefully angled his tool to scrape off the adhesive without scuffing the white canvas. There, now they were perfect. At that moment, Salvatore knew without a 5 doubt that his passion in life was to design and craft shoes.

Salvatore Ferragamo was born in 1898 in Bonito, Italy, a small town not far away from Naples. He was the eleventh of fourteen children, and though his family was full of love, they were poor. When four of Salvatore's older brothers left for America with dreams of striking it rich, they wanted him to go with them. However, Salvatore was not ready to leave Italy yet. He wanted to learn the art and science of shoemaking by apprenticing with a shoemaker in Naples first.

Not long after, his brothers wrote from America with news that they had found work in Boston; one was even working in a boot factory. Salvatore was intrigued by the idea of mass producing shoes. So far, all the shoes he had made had been produced by hand, which was time consuming. Learning to manufacture hundreds or even thousands of shoes at one time seemed to be the way of the future. Salvatore started saving his money and by fourteen, he had joined his brother in America.

The factory in Boston turned out to be a disappointment. While the machinery 20 was fascinating, the end products were far from comfortable - heavy, stiff and awkwardly shaped. Salvatore then realised the true value of handcrafted shoes. He wanted to make shoes that were comfortable and stylish.

While working in America, Salvatore observed that the movie business was booming. The first movie studio in Hollywood opened in 1911 and by 1919, 25 Salvatore knew that was where he wanted to be. Who better to design and make shoes for than the popular movie stars? He then bought a shop in Hollywood where he became known as the "Shoemaker for the Stars". Though the movie stars loved his fashionable and unique creations, Salvatore's shoes were not known for being comfortable.

Not one who rested on his laurels, Salvatore thought he could do better. He started attending anatomy classes at the University of Southern California, studying the way the bones connect in the foot and which part of the foot holds the majority of a person's weight. With his new found knowledge, Salvatore began to make small changes in his shoe designs so that his clients would purchase shoes that 35 were not only fashionable, but also comfortable. Salvatore's perseverance paid off. His shoes became even more popular and before long he could not make shoes fast enough to keep up with all his customers' orders.

When the time was right for Salvatore to further expand his shoes business in the mid-1920s, he felt that the American shoemakers did not have the same focus 40 on quality that he deemed was of utmost importance. Imbued with the value of loyalty for his own country, Salvatore decided to expand his business by moving back to Italy. In 1927 he opened his shop in Florence, Italy. He designed the workshop carefully by combining assembly line techniques he had learnt in the Boston boot factory with the manual shoe-making techniques he had been 45 practising for years.
