

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



Betty proudly pointed to her clever cat. Tom's discovery came as no surprise to Betty, as he had always been very sensitive to whatever was going on in the house. "He notices the smallest things, a spider on the ceiling, an ant crawling on the floor," Betty elaborated.

Betty's parents were also deaf and the family had always kept pets at home. One evening, when she was a young girl, she was sitting out on the porch swing with her mother. The family cat, Roy, began behaving in a strange manner. They could not fathom why it was acting that way until they saw him launch an attack on a rattlesnake that lay just three metres away from them. 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

I grew up in a small village called Kampong Baru. My cousin, Loke Tian, was near in age to me and he was my best friend. "Good, looks like we've a representative here," the teacher smiled. Forty pairs of eyes turned to look at me. Some were amused and some were incredulous but everyone cheered, for sure. I had no idea then that that match 20 would be one of the most embarrassing experiences of my life.
