As the white van noses down the dirt tracks above Inanda Dam outside Durban, people emerge from the mud and cinder block houses, waving. Like the dogs bounding eagerly at their heels, many are thin and bear the ravages of illness, but they all smile as they greet the driver of the van: Dog Lady, Angel of the Valley.

Silver-haired Durban grandmother, Jenny Konigkramer, 57, returns their greetings. She addresses each by name, and when she pulls over and climbs out, she bends to fuss over each dog.

"Your five are looking in much better condition, John?" she tells a man in blue overalls. Like most in the valley, he is unemployed. Jenny and her part-time helper, Anna Hlope, 38, heft a bag of dog pellets from the van. John takes off his cap in delight, then crouches and opens a corner of the bag to treat his five dogs to a handful. He disappears in a blur of wagging tails and Jenny drives on. "It's this that keeps me coming back," she says.

Jenny has been at it for six years, since the day she accompanied her dornestic worker, Queenie, to her home here to see her sick dog. "I was nervous at 15 first, there's so much talk of crime, but the people were friendly. And the suffering I saw opened my eyes." Queenie's dog had advanced canine distemper and had to be put down by Jenny's vet. "There were so many others with distemper and other problems, I knew I had to go back."

Jenny has a long-held passion for animals. "With this, I knew I could make a 20 difference." She scrounges supplies from donors – damaged bags of pellets, dog bowls, blankets and old kennels. She also takes dozens of animals to SPCA each month to be sterilised or treated for injury or illness.

"No one else does this for us," says Pasha, a young taxi driver. His first dog was killed by a car on the road. His second, an exuberant black puppy he calls 25 Snoopy, had washboard ribs and a sore on his neck caused by fleas when Jenny first saw him. She brought antibiotics and a bottle of the flea and tick dip she mixed herself, and showed Pasha how to use it. "Jenny talks nicely, she opens our eyes," says Pasha as Snoopy jumps up and licks her to thank her for curing him of fleas.

Tick-borne biliary, rabies and kennel cough are just some of the problems 30 here. Worse, to Jenny, are cases of cruelty. "I've seen hunting dogs caught in their owners' own snares with horrific limp injuries and several burnings and stabbings." Sometimes these animals have to be put down, and Jenny stays with them and strokes them to the end.

"But this work can be as traumatic as rewarding," Jenny confesses.

As Ida was walking on the rocky shore one evening, she heard faint cries from over the choppy waters. Peering through the dusk, she could make out an overturned sailboat in the distance and someone was clinging to it!

Without thinking of danger, Ida got into her boat and was soon skimming across the water to the rescue. When she reached the sailboat, she found not one but four young men clinging to it.

Ida pulled the four into her boat and headed for shore. She had rescued three teenagers and a twenty-year-old. They were very frightened and amazed to see a young girl at the oars of the rescue boat.

"Please, please, don't tell anyone about this," Ida implored them shyly. Ida felt that anyone in the same quagmire would have done the same. The youths promised to keep the rescue a secret.

From then on, Ida kept a watchful eye for anyone in trouble in the water. Once, she saved three farmers whose sheep had fallen into the bay. The three had borrowed a boat to pursue the sheep but the tide carried them farther and farther out. Then the boat filled with water and started to sink. In only a few minutes, Ida was taking the drowning men into her boat. After she had left them on shore, she went back and saved the sheep.


