Importance of the survival of sharks

Sharks have been around for more than 400 millions years. They have evolved to become the top predator in the oceans. They keep the prey populations healthy by targeting the weak and sick members of the prey populations. If sharks become extinct, the marine ecosystem will collapse.

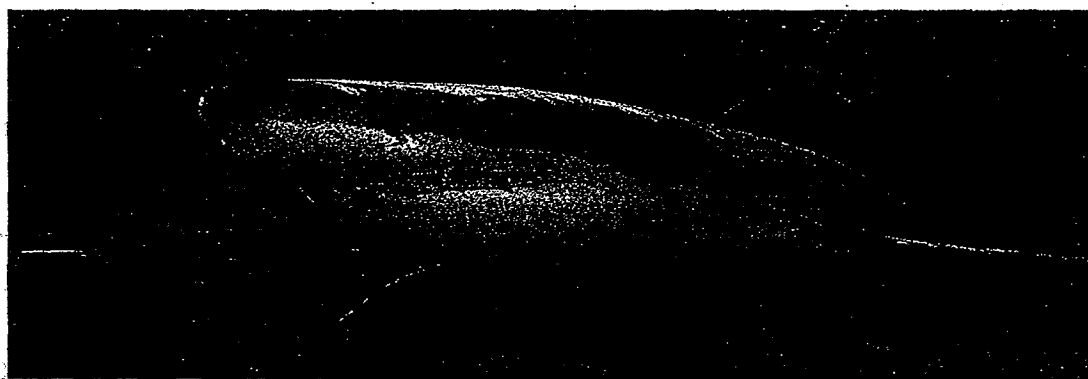
Cruelty in hunting sharks

During my first seven semesters as a medical student at Gadjah Mada University in Yogyakarta, Indonesia, I spent most of my time studying and in classrooms. She looked weak as she was still recovering from her recent fall and stroke. There were no relatives or friends with her. Even the bed beside her was empty. I introduced myself and told her that I wanted to gather additional information from her.

Anita started talking about herself. She told me that she had three children in primary school who were staying with a neighbour. "My husband died a year ago and I'm the sole breadwinner of my family. We are not rich and my pay as a cleaner is just enough for my children and me."

She also expressed her fear about what would become of her children if something bad happened to her. All I did was nod my head as a way of showing my sympathy.
