Wildlife Reserves Singapore Conservation Fund

Zoological institutions have an important role to play in conservation. They are responsible for educating the public and taking the leadership role in creating awareness, as well as addressing the dwindling numbers in the animal kingdom.

The three Wildlife Reserves Singapore (WRS) parks – Jurong Bird Park, Night Safari and Singapore Zoo – have been playing an active role in spearheading numerous conservation activities over the years which led them to be one of the most successful conservation parks in the region.



# Conservation and Research Project

# Oriental Pied Hornbill Project



December 2008 marked a breakthrough in local bird conservation when a pair of breeding Oriental Pied Hornbills, Sada and Lily, were reintroduced into the Bukit Timah Nature Reserve. They were temporarily put up in a large introductory aviary fitted with close circuit cameras to observe their activities. A fortnight upon their transfer, Lily sealed herself inside the artificial nesting box that was provided to facilitate the laying of eggs. Four eggs were laid. out of which, two chicks were hatched for their first clutch.

A bold step was taken in February 2009 to remove a panel of nylon from the aviary to allow Sada to be released into the wild to forage for food for the new mother and her chicks. In addition, supplementary feeding stations were set up around the aviary to ensure that there was enough food for Sada to feed his family. Sada and Lily were subsequently released into the wild and with that move came a third successful chick for their second clutch. The family now flies free in Bukit Timahl

The Oriental Pied Hornbill was believed to have become extinct for more than 150 years, until its rediscovery in 1994. With the initiation of the Singapore Hornbill Project, the population of hornbills in the wild has now burgeoned into a population of 50 from about an initial 10!
