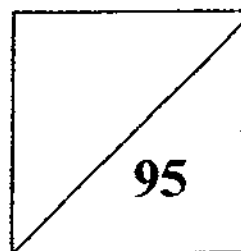

Sharks are commonly regarded as merciless marine predators capable of killing human beings. In reality, out of about 480 shark species in the world, only three – the Great White Shark, Tiger Shark and Bull Shark – are responsible for most of the attacks on people. On the other hand, the activities of mankind have endangered the survival of more than 100 shark species, with many of them on the brink of extinction.

Overfishing is one of the main threats to sharks. According to official estimates, more than 100 million sharks are caught every year. They are heavily fished for their fins to make “Shark Fin Soup”, an expensive but popular delicacy served in Chinese restaurants in China, Singapore and across Asia. In a bid to save the sharks, environmentalists are encouraging people not to consume their fins. They have drawn attention to the plight of sharks by showing pictures and video footages of the cruel act of “finning”. It involves fishermen cutting off the fins of sharks while they are still alive and throwing the creatures back into the sea to die a painful death. Unfortunately, the demand for shark fins has continued to grow as Asian societies become increasingly affluent. In addition, only a handful of countries have imposed restrictions on the killing of sharks for their fins. Large numbers of sharks have also been accidentally captured by commercial fishing boats catching other fishes, especially tuna and swordfish.

Another major threat is habitat destruction. Coastal development has destroyed mangroves and coral reefs that provide sharks with nursery, feeding and reproduction grounds. They are also the breeding grounds of numerous marine organisms that sharks eat. Large tracts of mangrove forests lining the shallow waters of coastlines have been removed to make way for the building of prawn farms, golf courses, resorts, residential estates, marinas and factories. The loss of mangrove forests has deprived young sharks of hiding places to escape predation by larger fish and other sharks. The situation is serious. In the Philippines, for example, mangrove forests have been reduced from 5,000 to only 300 square kilometres. Pollution of the seas has also contributed to habitat destruction. The discharge of oil, poisonous chemicals and other harmful substances has badly affected many coral reefs. Coral reefs are important habitats where the adults of many shark species hunt for food, mate and lay eggs or give birth to their young.

Urgent measures are needed before it is too late to save many shark species. Some of them may already have their populations reduced to levels so low that they are likely to become extinct. A key problem is reproduction. Sharks reproduce slowly. They take many years to reach maturity and produce only a few offsprings at a time. Human beings are catching them at a rate much faster than they are able to reproduce and recover their numbers. The time is now for mankind to act and prevent the extinction of sharks.

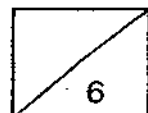
Just when Daniel thought everything had been settled, an insect flew across the living room and landed on the sofa. "Argh! Auntie Elaine, kill that flying cockroach!"

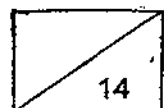
