Tay Thi is one of the mightiest people 1 have ever met. She has a **towering** presence, slightly more than 1.5 m tall and weighs 42 kg. Never have I seen such a petite individual who embodies such grit and selflessness.

Training to become an English teacher, Tay Thi fainted while at college in Vietnam because she had starved herself in order to be able to afford tuition. 5 However, she had the strength to persist and soon would become the first person in her village to graduate. She hopes to teach in her own village school where she wants to advocate education.

The eighth of nine children from an impoverished farming family in the Mekong Delta. Tay Thi shone in school but her mother demanded 10 unsuccessfully that she drop out after primary school and earn money as a maid in distant Ho Chi Minh City. In her eighth grade, her mother burnt her books to try to force her to drop out but she borrowed books and continued to excel. Tay Thi persevered even when her parents burnt her books again in twelfth grade and as she graduated from high school, she prepared secretly 15 for the college entrance examination. Her mother found out about this when Tay Thi left to take the examinations and lashed out, saying, "I hope you fail!" While other students arrived at the exam location escorted by cheering, doting parents, Tay Thi arrived alone, sobbing. Still, she aced the examinations.

With no parental support, college seemed unaffordable but Tay Thi 20 saved every cent she could and worked every holiday. At college, she confined herself to a food budget of S\$4.40 a week. Malnourished, she sometimes collapsed in the middle of class in a dead faint. Professors, teachers and students discovered that she was starved and penniless. This was a turning point. Her teachers approached Room to Read, an aid group, to give 25 her a scholarship. This gave her more pocket money and Tay Thi began to have proper meals.

Tay Thi is just as passionate about education for others. First, she encouraged her older brother to return to school, after years of working as a labourer. When he resisted, she registered him as a student, selecting his 30 courses and browbeating him until he gave in. Then, she coaxed her younger brother to follow her to college, where he is now a freshman. Even her parents have come round, partly because they see that Tay Thi will soon be an English teacher and the highest-paid member of the extended family.

"I'd like to change people's thinking," she said. "It's a way of helping 35 children in my community."

It is often believed that if you send a boy to school, you educate a man; if you send a girl to school, you educate a village. Although that is not always true, empowering girls remains one of the best ways to empower a community.

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

I have been scuba diving for fifteen years. I love the calmness of being submerged, the hypnotic sound of my breath and the quiet clicks of fish eating

Last October, I was on a diving holiday in the Philippines with a friend. After breakfast, we boarded a boat with seven other advanced divers. This was 5 my fortieth dive so I knew the drill. I put on the gear and dived off the boat, slowly sinking to about two hundred metres I saw luminous corals, languorous turtles and hundreds of tropical fish silhouetted in the deep ocean.

After nearly forty minutes, the sound of my breathing was drowned out by a low rumble. This was followed by deep powerful vibrations. as if a big boat 10 with a propeller was passing overhead. The instructor's eyes were wide with confusion. He did not know what was going on although he had done thousands of dives. We swam next to each other, staying close to the side of the reef. The situation felt sinister and dangerous.

Then, we were enveloped by clouds of white sand that mushroomed up 15 around us. "Could it be an underwater bomb?" I thought. The vibration became so intense that I could feel it in my bones and the sound turned into a deafening roar. I could see waterfalls of sand pouring over the seabed Cracks then began forming and the sand was sucked down. That was when I realised it was an underwater earthquake. 20

The instructor and I held hands and looked into each other's eyes. I felt comforted by his presence. I was paralysed but clear-headed. My heart was beating strong and fast. I did not panic but my body seemed to be on high alert. I remember thinking, "I've no power over this. We're going to stay very still and let it do whatever it's going to do."

The sound and vibration lasted only two or three minutes, though it felt much longer. When they stopped, I heard the swoosh of the sand falling over the seabed. Uneasily, I followed the instructor through the plumes of sand. searching for the others. It took immense will-power to resist the urge to swim to the surface as fast as I could but after five minutes, we saw them. It was 30 a huge relief to see my friends and we shared incredulous looks before finally surfacing, pulling out our breathing apparatus and shouting. "What was that?"

Back on the boat, we rushed to check the news and discovered that we had witnessed a huge earthquake, measuring 7.2 on the Richter scale. It released more energy than thirty Hiroshima bombs. "That was close!" I let out 35 a sigh. Not only have I survived but also experienced nature at its most stunning and ferocious state.

On the news, we were horrified to see that more than two hundred people had died with almost one thousand injured. Nearly all those who perished were on the island of Bohol, about thirty minutes away. I was due to 40

take a boat to the hospital there as I had a sore throat but at the last minute. I decided to dive and postpone the appointment. I could not imagine the outcome if I had kept my arrangement

I now believe the ocean is the safest place I can be during an earthquake. I can move with the tremors and yet am far from falling buildings or 45 debris that could kill me. The ocean saved my life
