

Immediately after someone sneezes, sometimes we hear the utterance 'God bless' - a common occurrence irrespective of which part of the world you are from. While the exact origin of this practice is unknown, the reasons behind such superstitions are about the same. The superstitious nature of an individual is not just restricted to luck, but goes well beyond it.

According to one such theory - one of the most interesting theory to be precise - the practice began in 16th century Europe where it was believed that the person's soul was thrown out of his body when he sneezed. A body without soul, they believed, was vulnerable to evil spirits and saying 'God bless' or 'bless you' helped keep these evil spirits away.

Most of the superstitious beliefs are typically characterised by the lack of logic and are spread by gullible people. Superstitions are defined as irrational beliefs which stem from our lack of knowledge or the fear of the unknown. Right from Friday the 13th and eye twitching, to animals and the weather, everything seems to have a superstitious belief associated with it.

Let us start with a few common superstitious beliefs from around the world. The black cat is definitely the most popular animal when it comes to luck. If a black cat crosses your path, it is said to be a sign of bad luck. Surprisingly though, there are some people who believe that a black cat brings good fortune when it walks towards you and similarly, takes it away when it walks away from you.

There are many more superstitions involving luck. If you break a mirror, you will have seven years of bad luck. If someone asks you to pass the salt, be careful not to spill it. If you see a ladder in the street, do not walk under the ladder; walk around it. Walking beneath a ladder is widely believed to bring bad luck to a person, so is gifting a wallet without money in it. If things go wrong throughout the day, it is probably because it is the thirteenth day of the month and most likely a Friday!

Many superstitions started a very long time ago but many people still continue to believe in them today. Some of them are easy to understand. For example, if you walk under a ladder, the person working at the top of the ladder could drop something on you. However most are not so easy to understand. If it is raining, take an umbrella but do not open it inside the house! So continue to keep your fingers crossed and hope that nothing bad happens!

I sat next to the pilot, near the open right-hand door of the jump plane, a Cessna 182. The altimeter attached to the chest strap of my parachute showed 2300 feet and climbing. Below, off to the right, I could see the drop zone a few miles away. The thought came to me that maybe I was a bit crazy. What was I doing, at the age of 70, preparing to jump out of a plane for the first time?

Was I frightened? No. Apprehensive was the word. Would I remember the five hours of intensive instructions: how to exit the aircraft, how to manoeuvre the parachute canopy to turn right and left, and how to 'flare out' to make a 'soft' landing?

Altimeter was reading 2600 feet. **Not long now**. The roar of the engine made talking difficult but none of us novices felt like talking anyway. The prospect of flinging yourself into space takes your mind off unimportant matters.

What irony, I thought. During World War Two, as a navigation instructor, I had never even taken a batch of students up in the training plane, a B-17, so I hoped I would not have to bail this out. No one had any faith in our chest-pack parachutes nor had we ever been briefed on how to use the contraptions. So we would toss the chutes into a corner of the cabin and hope the props would continue to revolve.

Now, 40 years later, I was voluntarily going to quit the security of this plane and trust the nylon and webbing to get down in one piece.

Altitude: 2900 feet. Stay calm, I told myself. Remember, you have total faith in the jumpmaster, who had also been your instructor. A comforting thought. The jumpmaster was my son, Burke.

At 3200 feet, Burke snapped one end of the static line to a ring on the floor and the other end to the parachute. The static line automatically pulls open the chute when the jumper leaves the plane. That would have been handy, in case a novice freezes or faints from fright.

The jumpmaster yelled, "Go!" Closing my eyes, I stepped off the plane. Somehow I remembered to arch my back as I fell, legs spread and head back.

I heard a 'pop' as the canopy opened and ballooned against the sky. Lovely sight. I looked down. Where was the drop zone?

There was no sensation of falling but my altimeter already read 2200 feet. Arriving over a barn a little too low, I pulled the right-hand toggle quickly and headed towards the field. The ground was coming up surprisingly fast. Some ten feet (I

hoped) above the grass, I hauled hard on both toggles. The canopy flared and seemed to hang motionless for a moment. Feet and knees locked together, I landed softly. That was a breeze.

A few minutes later, Burke came in for a graceful touchdown 50 yards in front of me. What a role reversal, I thought. I had taught the kid to ride his first bicycle and to swim, introduced him to skiing and taught him to sail.

Burke was laughing. He blurted out, "Nice going, Dad!"

"It was a piece of cake," I said, feeling a great rush of affection for the jumpmaster.
