Every year, millions of monarch butterflies fly south, covering over 3 000 kilometres on their way to their wintering grounds in Mexico.

However, these beautiful creatures are also <u>fragile</u> animals and are often unable to (16)

<u>withstand</u> sudden changes to their environment. In fact, such environmental changes can (17)

prove <u>fatal</u> for them. For example, in 2002, a rainstorm and freezing temperatures killed (18)

almost 80 percent of the monarch population in the "El Rosario" butterfly sanctuary.

Mike Quinn, a Texas biologist with the organisation *Monarch Watch*, suspects activities such as logging, which are <u>forbidden</u>, have destroyed sections of the forest. These sections serve as the butterflies' habitat.

The Mexican government, along with the World Wildlife Fund, has tried to implement (20) laws that will help secure the butterflies' future, for instance, offering payments to landowners to persuade them not to cut down trees. The hope is these measures will enable millions of monarch to continue to take flight each year.


