The avocado fruit is actually a berry. It has a large central seed, yellow-green flesh and a nearly black rubbery skin depending on variety. Selecting an avocado in (16) the shop can be tricky. These tips should help you. If the avocado is firm, it will take (17) about five days to ripen. You can quicken this process by sealing your avocado in a (18) paper bag with a ripe banana.

The banana gives off ethylene gas which accelerates the ripening process. If (19) you wish to preserve your avocado and slow the ripening, put it in the crisper of the refrigerator. A ripe avocado will keep for 2 to 3 days in the refrigerator. However, once it has been cut, it becomes very hard to keep avocados from turning brown. To prevent this, it is best to leave the seed in, squeeze some lemon or lime juice over the (20) avocado. Then, cover it in plastic wrap and keep in the refrigerator for 1 to 2 days.






## Enchanting Time in Korea



At the end of 2013, my 18-year-old daughter, Rika was poised between two worlds having just completed her final year of school and facing the challenge of starting at the University of Auckland. In the interim, she chose to fly over 11 500km to visit the city of her birth: Mumbai. Rika planned to spend her break visiting her ailing 80-year-old grandmother, Nana.

Our family migrated to New Zealand in 2000 when Rika was just five years old. We have returned to Mumbai three times since then but it had been four years since Rika had last seen Nana. Rika could not wait to see her Nana again.

Compared to the ease of Auckland where she now lives, the journey ahead was daunting- apart from flying alone, there would be the heat, pollution, language barriers and chaos of Mumbai to contend with. There would also be the hardship of leaving behind her iPhone, iPod and laptop. After her final school examination at the end of October, Rika left for the alroot and boarded the plane for a seventeen-hour flight.

As Nana was too frail to wait at the airport, Rika was to be greeted by her Aunt Maria and her five cousins.
