it was a sweltering hot day in Singapore. The morning sun seethed with ferocity in the sky. The sun was stinging his eyes as Zheng Nian took in the unremarkable sight below him — a sea of yellow. There were hundreds of strangers packed in the vast construction site. They were strangers from various countries, clad in yellow helmets and black safety boots. They had gathered at that site for the same reasons as he had, leaving wives and children behind miles away. From his village alone, a handful had worked in the city-state. Those who did not land a job in Singapore left their village for the bigger, richer cities in China. He had felt compelled to leave like the others to build a better world for himself and his family. "Maybe they are not strangers after all," he thought to himself. He could not resist leaning forward again from where he squatted, surveying the foreign world below him. He did not feel like he belonged here.

Assigned to pave cement on the roof, Zheng Nian wondered if the ground twelve storeys below him was equally hot. Up on the roof, the ground surprised his feet with the heaviness of heat burning through his safety boots. He thought of his body plunging accidentally down the point of no return. It caused him to break out into cold sweat. He retreated a little from the unfinished edge of the roof.

Since his arrival two days ago, the unforgiving heat and humidity in Singapore had persisted. Zheng Nian suddenly thought about his hometown in Hubei – walking in the creeping cold, wisps of winter in the air – when he could think so clearly, so effortlessly. He was usually huddled in layers of wool, scrunching across the snow-swept ground he could barely feel through his winter boots, the milky whiteness in the air blinding him, the harsh cold of winter biting into his heart. Now it was the other way around. Zheng Nian was all ready to ditch the white singlet on him, surrendering it like a white flag to the onslaught of the punishing heat.
