



Interesting Facts!

- The Portuguese introduced the curry puff to the Southeast Asian region in the 16th century.
- The Malaysian *epok-epok* (curry puff) is derived from the Portuguese *empanada* pastry.
- *Empanada* is made by folding a piece of dough or bread around meat or cheese stuffing.
- Curry puffs are characterised by varying the amount of spices used.

The Chinese, Malay or Indian culture is reflected in the crust.

- The flaky British-style pastry is used in many Chinese and Malay versions.
- The Indians make samosas with thin European-influenced pastry.

- chicken or potato curry
- sardines

SIMPLE CURRY PUFF RECIPE



Making the filling

1. Cut the potatoes into small pieces.
2. Boil the potatoes.
3. Stir fry the potatoes with chopped onions and curry spices in a pan.
4. Let the filling cool down to room temperature.

Making the pastry

1. Combine the flour, salt and yeast in a bowl.
2. Add lukewarm water and knead the dough for about 10 minutes.
3. Let the dough rest.

Roll out the dough and cut circles out of it. Fill the pastry and fry the puffs in hot oil. Serve the puffs hot with either chilli or tomato sauce.
