
Come And Visit Pulau Ubin!

Description

Pulau Ubin is an island situated in Northeast of Singapore. Its rural or "kampong" lifestyle is a delightful retreat from the hustle and bustle of Singapore.

It is a granite outcrop with several granite quarries that are no longer operating. These abandoned quarries have been fenced off and filled with water and they stay as picturesque relics of Ubin's heritage. While most of the villagers have relocated to Singapore, the island maintains its rustic charm with coconut palms and other fruit trees. Old rubber plantations make up a sizable part of the island.





How to get to Pulau Ubin?

Take a bum boat ride (\$2.50 per person) from Changi Point Ferry Terminal to Pulau Ubin Main Jetty. No ticket will be issued; cash payment upon boarding. Services run from sunrise to sunset.

The boat will only leave when there are 12 passengers.

Attraction 1: Tanjong Chek Jawa

At the southeast of the island lies "Tanjong Chek Jawa" which was saved from reclamation due to public outcry. Tanjong Chek Jawa is rich in marine life, such as sand dollars, starfish, sea hares, cuttlefish and sponges, which is rarely seen on the main island. Viewers can view Tanjong Chek Jawa either from the Jejewi Tower or the Broadwalk that allows close up views of the marine life.

Guided Tours:

- Book in advance by calling the visitor centre's hotline: 65424108.
- It is open to all ages, however, children under the age of 12 must be under guardian or parental guidance.
- A fee of \$8 per person to be paid directly to the guide during the tour.
- All participants must wear covered footwear.

Attraction 2: Sensory Trail

Experience Ubin's wonderful nature through your different senses along the "Sensory Trail" which is easy-going and takes about 2 hours to complete.

Visitors will be accompanied by a nature guide to touch, see, and smell fruit trees, herbs and spices, plants used in medicine and native plants of the mangrove forest.
