The records of natural history contain many astonishing examples of the ability of animals to find their way home after making long journeys. Salmon, for example, are born in freshwater streams but they swim down to the sea to grow and mature. A few years later, they swim back upstream to breed and sometimes, even to die. Hence, the particular stream în which they die in is almost always the same one in which they were born.

What underwater signposts can these fish possibly follow? Biologists have discovered that the salmon, like many other fish, has an acute sense of smell and is able to remember slight differences in the chemical composition of water. It remembers the distinctive "fragrance" of its native stream so that as it moves upstream and meets with dozens or hundreds of streams along the way, it is still able to make the correct choice each time until it finally arrives home.

Long-distance migration is especially common in birds, because many species must make yearly journeys between their nesting sites and prime feeding areas far away. Each year, over 100,000 sooty terns, a seabird, travel from the west coast of Africa all the way across the Atlantic to a tiny island near the tip of Florida in the United States. Here they build their nests and breed. Once the young can fly, they all fly back over the Atlantic. Why do they migrate at all? Isolated islands tend to provide protection from predators like cats and foxes. Therefore, like many other seabirds, making the trans-oceanic voyage to reach one such haven is better than nesting on the nearby African shores.

A somewhat different reason lies behind the north-south migration of birds in the temperate areas. In spring, birds like geese, ducks and robins make their way north into the countryside where large quantities of food are becoming freshly available. Without delay, they quickly rear one or more broods of young. As winter approaches and the food supply declines, all fly south again.

Human beings could never make such journeys unaided by maps and navigational instruments. How do birds do it? A large part of the answer lies in their ability to use celestial clues. They use the position of the sun or stars in the sky to guide them. Experiments have been conducted where a type of bird called indigo bunting attempt flights under the artificial night sky of a planetarium. The birds would use the position of groups of stars in the planetarium sky to guide their flight.

Migrating birds not only can figure out the compass directions, but they also exhibit the ability to determine their position on the surface of the earth with reference to the position of their intended destination. They can sense the earth's magnetic field, which varies in an orderly way from point to point over the earth's surface and that then enables a bird that is using it to travel home even over unfamiliar terrain and great distances.
