





William Kamkwamba was born in Malawi, a country where modern science was a mystery. It was also a land withered by drought and hunger; a place where hope and opportunity were hard to find.

Captivated by the workings of electricity as a boy, William was motivated to study Science in Malawi's top schools. His interest in electricity also led him to read about windmills in a book called *Using Energy*. That fuelled his imagination and he dreamt of building **one** that would bring electricity and water to his village and change his life and the lives of those around him. But in 2002, a severe drought struck, causing his family to lose all the crops on their farm and widespread famine in his country.

Unable to pay the eighty-dollar-a-year tuition for his education, William was initially disappointed about being forced to drop out and help his family hunt for food as thousands across the country starved and died. Yet he refused to let go of his dreams. In a desperate attempt to retain his education, William began to visit the school library frequently. It was there that he discovered his true love for electronics. He even set up a small business repairing radios in his village but the earnings from his work with the radios were barely enough for his survival.

All through the difficult time, William had not given up on his ambition. With nothing more than a fistful of corn-meal in his stomach, a small pile of once-forgotten science textbooks, and a large supply of curiosity and determination, he started on a daring plan to bring his family a set of luxuries that only two percent of Malawians could afford and what the West considers a necessity—electricity and running water.

"Misala (crazy)! Misala!" his neighbours taunted and ridiculed him as he went about the village scavenging for parts to make his dream a reality. William had a strong desire to prove them wrong. In fact, what the villagers thought of him only strengthened his spirit. He wanted to show everyone what grit and ingenuity could do. Hence, much to the surprise of everyone, what emerged from scrap metal, tractor parts, and bicycle fragments that William had found around the village and put together was a simple yet working windmill. It was an unlikely device and a small miracle that eventually powered four lights, complete with homemade switches. It even had a circuit breaker made from nails and wire. The success amazed even William himself as he had used parts that were not commonly used to make windmills and he was not sure if his first attempt would work.

	Buoyed with hope by the success of his first windmill in generating electricity, 35 William created a second machine. This turned a water pump that could overcome
	the terrible effects of the drought and famine that loomed with every season.
	Soon, news of William's <i>magetsi</i> a <i>mphepo</i> —his "electric wind"—spread. Local farmers and journalists investigated the spinning device and William's fame reached beyond the borders of his home. The boy who was once called crazy by his people became an inspiration to them and those around the world.




