

Worse still, the lorry driver seemed to be spurting ahead like he was determined to have a race between them.

Horrified, I saw the two vehicles side by side and bearing down on us. The small car had to go behind the lorry. The two-lane road was not able to fit three vehicles! Ted jammed on his brakes.
