For thousands of years, glass was thought to be something to look at. It was valued for
decoration and for (51) precious objects. Glass really became useful when it
was thought of as something to (52) through.
No one really knows when or where the (53) of making glass was first
learned, though we know it has been used since very early days. The chief

together at a high temperature. Since these materials are found in abundance in many parts of the

When I was quite young, my family had one of the first telephones in our neighbourhood. I was too little to reach the telephone, but used to listen with fascination when my mother talked into it. Magic! I discovered that somewhere inside that wonderful device lived an amazing person - her name was Information Please and there was nothing that she did not know.

My first personal experience with this genie-in-the-receiver came one day while my mother was visiting a neighbour. Amusing myself with some tools, I whacked my finger with a hammer. The pain was unbearable, but there didn't seem to be of much use crying because there was no one home to offer sympathy. I walked around the house sucking my throbbing finger, finally arriving at the stairway. The telephone! Quickly, I unhooked the receiver and held it to my ear. "Information Please," I said into the mouthpiece just above my head. A click or two, and a small clear voice spoke into my ear. "Information." "I hurt my fingerrr-" I wailed into the phone. The tears came readily enough now that I had an audience. "Is your mother home?" came the question. "Nobody's at home but me," I blubbered. "Can you open your icebox?" she asked. I said I could. "Take some ice and hold it on your finger. That will stop the hurt; be careful when you open the icebox," she admonished. "And don't cry. You'll be all right."

After that, I called Information Please for everything I asked for help with Mathematics and 15 Science, and she told me that a pet chipmunk would eat fruits and nuts. Another day I was at the telephone. "Information," said the now familiar voice. "How do you spell fix?" F-I-X!" And then there was the time that Petey, our pet canary, died. I called Information Please and told her the sad story. She listened, then said the usual things grown-up say to soothe a child. But I was inconsolable. Why was it that birds should sing so beautifully and bring joy to whole families, only to end as a heap of feathers 20 feet up, on the bottom of a cage? She must have sensed my deep concern, for she quietly said, "Paul, always remember that there are other worlds to sing in." Somehow, I felt better.

Then, when I was nine years old, we moved across the country to Boston and I missed my mentor acutely. A few years later, on my way back to college, my plane landed in Seattle, I had about half an hour between plan connections, and without thinking what I was doing. I dialled my hometown operator 30 and said. "Information Please." Miraculously, I heard the small, clear voice that I knew so well: "Information." I hadn't planned this, but I heard myself saying, "Could you tell me, please, how to spell the word 'fix'?" There was a long pause. Then came the softly spoken answer. "I guess," said Information Please, "that your finger must have healed by now." I laughed. "So it's really still you I wonder if you have any idea how much you meant to me during all that time..." "I wonder," she replied, "if you know how much you meant to me? I never had any children, and I used to look forward to your calls. Silly, wasn't it?" It didn't seem silly, but I didn't say so. Instead I told her how often I had thought of her over the years, and I asked if I could call her again when I came back to visit my sister when the semester was over. "Please do. Just ask for Sally." "Goodbye Sally." it sounded strange for Information Please to have a name.

Just three months later, I was back again at the Seattle airport. A different voice answered, "Information," and I asked for Sally. "Are you a friend?" "Yes," I said. "An old friend." "Then I'm sorry to have to tell you. Sally had only been working part-time in the last few years because she was ill. She died five weeks ago." But before I could hang up, she said, "Wait a minute. Did you say your name was Willard?" "Yes." "Well, Sally left a message for you. She wrote it down." "What was it?" I asked, almost knowing in advance what it would be. "Here it is. I'll read it - Tell him I still say there are other worlds to sing in. He'll know what I mean." I thanked her and hung up. I did know what Sally had meant.
