

On the morning of the thirty-fifth day of the drought, the sun rose over the black clouds and a wind blew in from the sea, smelling of rain. The inhabitants of an isolated Pacific village staggered half-asleep from their thatched huts and stood facing the wind, laughing like small children. Such clouds they had never seen before. They were higher than mountains and as wide as the Island, dark as the depths of night. At last the sun was returning all the water it had stolen.

However as the islanders watched, the wind grew stronger. Within minutes, the sea was swept into white-peaked waves that burst into foam on the beach. Palms creaked and their leaves bent as the wind blew. The village was shrouded in dust and fiving leaves.

The islanders hurried back to their huts. The increasing strength of the wind had whilpped the smiles from their faces. The voices of the petrified inhabitants were shrill with alarm. This was the beginning of a hurricane.

Even as they tried to close the windows, the wind hit with full force and tore the handles from their hands. The air screamed into their huts as though they 15 were like demons which choked and blinded them with dust.

Families crouched in fear and held onto one another with heads bowed while their roofs were blown away. Outside they could hear the death sounds of trees, shrieks of splintered wood, then thumps as the giant trees of their village were ripped from the ground.

The rain came with the same murderous fury, a torrent of dark water which burst against the village like a tidal wave, soaking the huts in seconds and destroying the walls. The water level rose to the ankles of the terrifled men and women who tried to hold on to their children. They screamed and prayed but could not hear the sounds of their own voices. Their ears were full of the noise of wind, 25 water and thunder. White fire lit the fear on their faces, flash after flash of lightning.

In the darkness of Luisa's hut, three people huddled against the strongest wall, waiting for death. Samu was as speechless as Jonasi and Luisa by now, was so frightened she could neither cry nor pray. The black water rose around their

The torrent had swept banks of debris against uprooted 40 trees, forming dams. Goats, hens and pigs had disappeared. Many of the huts had been swept out to sea.
