A gifted teacher, Anne Sullivan, is best known for her work with Helen Keller, a deaf, blind and mute child whom she had taught to communicate.

Sullivan and her two siblings grew up in <u>poverty-stricken</u> conditions, and (16) struggled with health problems. At the age of five, Sullivan contracted an eye disease called trachoma, which severely damaged her sight. She learned about schools for the blind and became <u>insistent</u> to get an education as a means to escape poverty.

Sullivan attended the Perkins School for the Blind in 1880, and underwent surgery to help better her limited vision. Despite the physical strain on her own limited (18) sight, Sullivan helped Keller continue her studies at Radcliffe College in 1900. She spelled the notes of class lectures on Keller's hand, and spent hours conveying (19) information from textbooks to her. As a result, Keller became the first deaf-blind person to graduate from college.



When Sabriye was in the eighth grade, she went with her class on a field trip to a museum. There, they were allowed to handle items from Tibet. It was these which captured and fuelled Sabriye's imagination. She began to dream of going to Tibet and starting a school for the blind there. However, she was told over and over again that this was impossible. Why? Sabriye was blind.

To lay the foundation for her dream, Sabriye first had to find a way to study the printed. Tibetan anguage to convert class learning materials to the Braille system. At that time, no system existed to create Braille from written Tibetan. She refused to give up easily and went on to invent one for her own use. Eventually, it was only after her school for the blind had been established did her invention become the official Braille system for the Tibetan people. Then, she went to Beijing and completed a crash course in Chinese since the Tibetan officials only conversed in Chinese and Tibetan.

Subsequently, she met with the Tibetan officials to tell them her intentions. However, despite being fluent in both languages, Sabriye still struggled to explain her mission to them because they fiercely insisted that foreigners were not allowed to visit Tibet. However, she assured them that her mission was not political, but only to help the blind. Despite this assurance, the officials first told her there were no blind people in Tibet, though this was not true. Then, they emphasised the dangers of getting around in such a mountainous area with few and dangerous roads. Finally, they suggested that she should raise the money for the school and hand it over to them. She was suspicious of their actual motive as she had heard stories where money raised was never passed on to the needly. Eventually, despite the repeated discouraging remarks from the officials, Sabriye still proceeded with her plans.

However, not everyone was as unscrupulous. Some honest people told her outright that she would not succeed as she was blind. Yet Sabriye believed she was definitely more blessed because her impairment allowed her senses of hearing, smell and touch to be much more developed than that of a sighted individual. She used them to make her own mental map of "landmarks" to manoeuvre her way around. Through her cane, she got essential information about the ground and obstacles or possible things to guide her, such as sidewalks, kerbs or walls.

For Sabriye, travelling on horseback in the mountains was of no issue. The riding, lessons she attebded when she was young had given her much confidence it was this sense of self-confidence that Sabriye was adamant to instil in her own students. Dolma, a firm believer in Sabriye's passion helped her to identify the blind children to attend the school. Many of them were forced by their poor families to earn a living' by begging in the streets. Together, Sabriye and Dolma adopted these visually-handicapped charges. They provided them with an education and taught them lifeskills. They believed that this would eventually pave their way to a more productive and meaningful life as more job opportunities would be open to them.
