A strong and healthy lion usually prefers to hunt for wild animals rather than to prey on homes of men. In Africa, however, the domestic cattle are often attacked by lions. When the lions are famished, or when the wild animals are difficult to come by, the natives in Africa will lose their capability to protect their cattle. Besides, domestic cattle are easier to kill too.

The Africans shut their cattle up in enclosures at night. Nevertheless, hungry lions will climb over the high fences of thom branches and attack the cattle. Sometimes, they use a different strategy. They will provi round and roar loudly near the enclosures. As a result, the terrified cattle will break down the fence themselves in their fear and gallop into the open savannah. Once they are out in the open, there is no escape from their predators. Sometimes a very hungry lion will capture an animal in broad daylight right in front of its owner.

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A lion may lose its initial fear of human beings if it often hunts domestic cattle. It has grown used to coming near villages. This may lead to attacking and killing of villagers when the lion is desperately hungry. If *this* happens, the lion may develop a taste for human flesh. It will lie in wait for natives atmost every night, especially after it has discovered that a child or an unarmed man is an easy dinner. Such a lion is called a 'man-eater'.

The 'man-eater' may become a real terror and a threat to the entire village. When a lioness has learned to enjoy the flesh of men, it is most likely to teach all her cubs to feast on human flesh. Such lions can be bold. They will rip the huts of natives to get the sleeping people inside! All the villagers will join forces, combine all strength and organise a lion-hunt when a 'man-eater' is discovered in the village. This is because the villagers understand that until the lion is killed, nobody is safe.

Many stories have been told regarding lions. Both white people and 25 Africans have their own versions of heroes who have shown great courage when facing the ferocious beasts. There was this story of a young African. A lion appeared and sprang on one of the sheep while he was looking after his master's sheep. The brave boy counter-attacked the lion with his spear instead of running away. Finally, he managed to kill it but was badly wounded. Later, he was asked why he had fought **30** the lion single-handedly.

"Weren't you afraid?" they asked.

"Sure I was frightened," he answered. "But I thought it was best to take the risk rather than to be ashamed all my life for losing the sheep!"
