Although many people are afraid of spiders, they are not harmful animals. They do not usually bite unless they are disturbed. Very few spiders' bites are poisonous. Spiders are really helpful. Each year they eat thousands of harmful insects which they trap in webs.

The body of a spider has two parts joined by a slender neck or waist.

The front part is the head and the back part is the abdomen. Spiders have eight legs. The legs are very long and hairy. If a young spider loses a leg, it will eventually grow another one.

At the bottom of the abdomen are the spinnerets that make the silk. The silk comes out as a liquid but as soon as it comes into contact with air, it becomes solid. Spiders spin silk to make webs and egg sacs. Different kinds of spiders make different kinds of webs, depending on their spinnerets.

Spiders are predators. That means they hunt, kill and eat other animals. When a spider has caught something to eat, it bites it. A spider does not eat its prey at once. It wraps it in silk and saves it for later.


