1 July 1964, I lay in bed, waiting for the bees to show up, thinking of what Rosaleen had said when I told her about their nightly visitations.

"Bees swarm before death," she'd said.

Rosaleen had worked for us since my mother died. My daddy - whom I called T. Ray because 'Daddy' never fitted him - had pulled her out of the peach orchard, where she had worked as one of his pickers. She had a big round face and a body that sloped out from her neck like a pup tent, and she was so black that night seemed to seep from her skin. She lived alone in a little bouse tucked back in the woods, not far from us, and came every day to cook, clean, and be my stand-in mother. Rosaleen never had a child herself, so for the last ten years I had been her pet guinea pig.

Bees swarm before death. She was full of crazy ideas that I ignored, but, I lay there thinking about this one, wondering if the bees had come with my death in mind: Honestly, I was not that disturbed by the idea. Every one of those bees could have descended on me like a flock of angels and stung me till I died, and it would not have been the worst thing to happen. People who think dying is the worst thing do not know a thing about life.

My mother died when I was four years old. It was a fact of life, but if I brought it up, people would suddenly get interested in their hangnails and cuticles, or else distant places in the sky, and seemed not to hear me. Once in a while, though, some caring soul would say, "Just put it out of your head, Lily. It was an accident. You didn't mean to do it."

That night I lay in bed and thought about going to be with my mother in paradise. I would meet her saying, "Mother, forgive. Please forgive," and she would kiss my skin till it grew chapped and tell me I was not to blame. She would tell me this for the first ten thousand years.





Raised voices, running feet and violent thudding on his locked cabin door jerked Captain Sasongko Samudy from his sleep. His clock showed 4 a.m. With a shiver, Sasongko realised someone was trying to force his door open. The cabin door soon gave way and three men burst in. Masked and clad in black, each clutched a metre-long parang, a sword-like weapon, ready to strike. One man slammed it into Sasongko's face, knocking him to the floor. As blood gushed from his head, the captain felt the intruders bind his hands and feet.

"Tell your crew to come to the bridge," the leader snapped in Indonesian. "If your entire crew doesn't surrender, we'll kill all of you!"

The Indonesian skipper had sailed this route a hundred times and never encountered trouble. That June day in 2005 was the third of a seven-day voyage from Singapore to Yangon and Myanmar and Sasongko's fully laden, 7000-tonne oil tanker Nepline Delima, with its crew of 18, should have been cruising serenely through the Straits of Malacca but his luck had run out.

Pirates roamed these waters, hijacking ships and selling off the cargo. The insistent buzz of the intercom on his cabin wall woke Mohamed Hamid, the officer in charge of the crew.

"There's a speedboat next to us!" a seaman told him. "It might be pirates!" Hamid called the bridge; nobody answered. Had pirates seized it? The 28-year-old Malaysian pulled on his orange overalls and edged into the corridor to investigate. As he mounted the stairs to the upper deck, he heard the captain's voice over the loudspeaker.

"Wake up! Wake up!" Sasongko pleaded. "There are pirates on our ship. All crew go to the bridge!" Then Hamid heard the captain cry out in pain.

Going from cabin to cabin, he roused six men and led them to the control room.

"We have no weapons," he said. "Whatever the pirates want, give it to them!" He told the sailors to go to the bridge. As the first sailor crossed the gangway and stepped into the bridge, a masked man grabbed him around the chest and thrust a parang to his throat. Panicked, the other hands fled. Hamid froze. The pirate was big and powerful. He could see only the man's eyes, and they were flat and merciless. The sailor is as good as dead, Hamid thought. He ran for his life.

Leaping down from deck to deck, Hamid darted into the tanker's bowels, hunting for shipmates. Several times he glimpsed pirates and was able to elude them in the maze of companionways* and corridors that he knew so well. But he could not find a single crewman. Bewildered, he hid under the bed in a deserted cabin for a breather. No sooner had he settled than the door opened. He realised that while he had been hunting for his shipmates, the pirates were hunting him. Lying stock-still, he watched a beam of light traverse the cabin as a pirate scanned the room. For an instant, the torchlight pierced his hiding place and grazed his knees. Then the door slammed and he was in darkness again.

*A companionway is a staircase or ladder that leads from one deck to another on a ship.

Relaxing, Hamid figured that if he could dodge the pirates, maybe others had too. He slid from under the bed and resumed searching. Quickly crossing the stern deck, he spotted a pirate just metres away. Hamid was sure he had been spotted. He raced across the deck and dropped onto the platform metres below. Hamid glanced at his watch: 5 a.m. This frantic game of cat and mouse had lasted an hour. He had to hide, but it was easier said than done: the 80-metre-long deck was lit up like a football stadium.


