

Her influence was extraordinary. She could make the men stop drinking, write home to their wives, submit to pain. "She was wonderful," said a veteran, "at cheering up anyone who was a bit low." The surgeons were amazed at her ability to strengthen men doomed to an operation. "The magic of her power over men was felt," wrote Kinglake, "in the room – the dreaded, the blood-stained room – where 5 operations took place. For instance, the maimed soldier, if not yet resigned to his fate, might be craving death rather than meet the knife of the surgeon. When an injured soldier saw the honoured Lady-in-Chief patiently standing beside him and with lips closely set and hands folded, forcing herself to experience his pain, he would obey her silent command and bring himself to submit and endure."

The troops worshipped her. "What a comfort it was to see her pass even," wrote a soldier. "She would speak to one, and nod and smile to many more; but she could not do it to all. We lay there by hundreds; but we could kiss her shadow as it fell and lay our heads on the pillow, contented."

For her sake, the troops gave up the bad language which has always been the privilege of the British private soldier. "Before she came," ran another letter, "there was cursing and swearing but after that it was as holy as a church."

When the war was over, Miss Florence Nightingale wrote, "...the tears come into my eyes as I think how, amidst scenes of loathsome disease and death, there arose above it all the innate dignity, gentleness and chivalry of the men shining in the midst of what must be considered the lowest depths of human misery, and preventing instinctively the use of one expression which could distress a gentlewoman."
