Pangolins live in tropical jungles in Asia and Africa. Their backs and sides are covered in sharp scales made of thick hair. In fact, pangolins look like small armoured tanks! They eat termites, ants and other insects. They do not have teeth, but they have long sticky tongues. When they find an insect nest, they break it open with their claws and lick up the insects.

Scared pangolins curl up into a ball. Their sharp scales protect them from attacks, and they also spray nasty-smelling urine on their enemies to fend them off. Pangolins are threatened because of habitat destruction. They are also killed for their meat for making traditional Chinese medicine. Although pangolins are a protected species, officials around the world confiscated 100 tonnes of pangolin meat last year. Wildlife experts believe that poachers smuggle more than 500 tonnes of pangolin meat to China every year.

In Singapore, there is a small population of pangolins living in nature reserves like the Central Catchment Area and the Bukit Timah Nature Reserve. Many hikers are fascinated by these shy and slow-moving creatures. Due to the dwindling natural habitat here, pangolins do stray outside the safety of the forests onto pavements and roads. As a result, these slow-moving creatures are often hurt or killed by traffic. In the past 10 years, the local authorities have been putting in effort to rescue these creatures, and more than 27 stray pangolins have been rescued and returned to the nature reserves. As these shy noctumal creatures are difficult to see in the wild, the Singapore Zoo's Night Safari is launching the world's first pangolin exhibition in June this year.


