It takes a long time for a young elephant to learn to control its trunk, which contains thousands of different muscles. Baby elephants trunks often wiggle around out of control, and the elephants sometimes trip over them. They also suck on their trunks, like a child sucking its thumb.

Elephants usually live between 45 and 60 years. They may lese and regrow their melanteeth sixtimes in their lifetime. When their last set of teeth wears out, elephants cannolonger chew food and they die. This is a common cause of death, as few predators can kill an adult elephant. In fact, there is only one animal that poses a real threat to elephants – humans.

A hundred years ago, five to ten million elephants wandered freely across Africa. By 1990, only around 600 000 were left. Many people feared there would soon be none left.

One reason why so many elephants died is that they no longer had enough land on which to roam in search of food. Land that was once occupied by elephants and other wild animals had been taken over by people for faming and raising cattle. With nowhere to go, the elephants starved. Another more serious problem is hunting. Elephant tusks are made of smooth, hard ivory, which is very beautiful and easy to carve. People carved ivory into all kinds of things from comb to pool balls to piano keys.

With more powerful weapons, it had become easier for hunters to obtain elephants' tusks. To meet the strong demand for them, hunters even killed elephants that were protected in wildlife reserves. Many people were willing to break the law and killed elephants when a single tusk was worth thousands of dollars. By 1980s, these poachers were killing up to 100 000 elephants a year.

The only way to put an end to poaching was to ban the sale of ivory. Thus, in 1989, a concerted effort was made by many countries to make trading of ivory a crime. Immediately, the demand for ivory fell and so did the price. It dropped from 400 dollars to 60 dollars per kilogram. With little money to be made from poaching, the slaughter mostly stopped.

Land for elephants remains a problem. In Asia, elephants live in the forests of Indonesia, Thailand and other countries. However, the forests are being cut down at an alaming rate. This results in fewer and fewer wild elephants as they have nowhere to live. A hundred years ago, 100 000 elephants lived in Asia. Now, there are fewer than 20 000. The only way to save elephants and other creatures is to leave them with enough land. In the coming century, as the number of people on Earth continues to grow, this will be one big challenge.


