Associate Professor Munidasa Winslow, a specialist in psychiatry at Raffles Hospital, sees at least one case of a compulsive spender a month. "A person who is oniomanic (the technical term for shopping addiction) tends to be (21) <u>compulsive</u> and there is usually a reason for it, such as marital or family problems," he said.

As with any kind of addiction behaviours, the spending binges often start out as normal activities. But when it is taken to the extreme, these people cannot stop despite knowing that they should. While they may enjoy the adrenaline-pumping (22) <u>euphoria</u> with each purchase, the feeling is (23) <u>fleeting</u>. Typically, compulsive spenders would end up buying items they have no intention to use. When asked, they would give irrational reasons on why they needed them.

A former shopping addict, Geraldine Tan, admitted that she would engage in "retail therapy" whenever she felt stressed or unhappy. Eventually, her spending (24) escalated out of control and she racked up a debt of \$80,000.

Associate Professor Winslow said that it was important for spending addicts to break the cycle of addiction with professional help. For Geraldine, her road to recovery has been (25) arduous. Though she is not yet debt-free, her debts are now manageable.

Lounging on my bedroom floor in the long light of yellow sunset, I lazily copied sentences. Kira stuck her head in. "Quick, Nanjin! Your mother calls – her time has come!"
