Turbulent muddy water pressed against him, making it hard to breathe despite the oxygen tank strapped to his back. Inching his way forward with a 60metre lifeline, his only tether to safety, Abdul was 15 metres under the flooding Padma River in Bangladesh, searching for dead bodies trapped in a sunken ferry. On that dive in May 2005, Abdul found seven bodies pinned against a grill, before being pulled back to the rescue boat.

"I thought I was going to die from the crush of the water," said the 39-yearold diver for the Bangladeshi fire service, "but it would be a shame if I came back empty-handed."

Over 100,000 people use ferries each day to traverse Bangladesh's more than 230 rivers. Overcrowded and often less than seaworthy, the ferries run into trouble in the monsoon when the rivers are flooded and filled with debris. The power of the water, plus the fact that most of the passengers cannot swim, means there is little hope of pulling anyone out alive when a ferry sinks.

For the past 15 years, Abdul had risked his own life to return as many bodies as possible so that grieving families could have a proper burial.

"I love helping my fellow human beings in times of tragedy," admitted the father of a twin boy and girl, "I'm not afraid but I tell my colleagues that if I die, to send my body to my family."

Born on the banks of the Salda River northeast of the capital Dhaka, Abdul 20 had always been a strong swimmer and immediately answered an advertisement for fire service divers when a relative showed it to him in 1990. Told that he should move to the Gulf states to become a commercial diver and earn more money, the devout Muslim decided he liked the challenge of going where others would not dare to go.

"He is exposed to diseases and infections from the polluted waters as well as many other health problems from diving repeatedly during rescue operations. So many times I have thought he was going to die," said Dilip Kumar Gosh, Abdul's commander at the Siddique Bazar Fire Station office in Dhaka.
