When she was seventeen, a wealthy English girl named Florence Nightingale was determined to pursue a career in nursing. Her parents were angry and refused to allow her to become a nurse because, at that time, it was not thought to be a suitable profession for a well-educated woman. In those days hospitals were filthy and dangerous places too. The smells were so bad that they literally made people sick. Florence, however, had made up her mind and travelled to different hospitals and took up courses on becoming a nurse.

There came a time when numerous people caught the deadly disease, cholera, and many nurses refused to help because they too were afraid of becoming ill. Florence, on the other hand, patiently nursed all the patients who came her way.

When British soldiers went to fight the Grimean War, Florence was placed in charge of the nurses who cared for the wounded. Florence believed that hospitals needed good medicine, fresh food, pure water, clean sheets and bandages. She felt that these items were necessary because they were either 15 difficult to get or expensive. She devoted her time to making hospital conditions the best they could be. The wounded soldiers liked her because of the conditions they were treated in.

They fondly referred to her as the "Lady with the Lamp" because she carried a lamp through the dark rooms of the hospital everyday. She also visited every wounded soldier on a daily basis and spoke to them with care. All the soldiers who recovered never failed to speak about the cleanliness of the hospital and the care they received.

Florence Nightingale, later in her life, laid the foundation stone for professional nursing by summarising her principles in life into a book entitled 25 'Notes on Nursing'. Today, the Nightingale Pledge is taken by new nurses in her honour and the annual International Nurses Day is celebrated around the world on her birthday.
