## SECTION H: Comprehension Open-Ended Questions (5 x 2 marks) Read the following passage carefully and answer the questions that follow.

Have you ever had an experience like this? You have a strange feeling that something is going to happen and it does happen.

Some years ago, a ten-year-old boy in West Germany was suddenly gripped by a feeling of terror. While his mother was preparing dinner, he rushed up to her and cried, "Mummy, Mummy, get out of the kitchen quickly! Something terrible is going to happen." Fortunately, his mother took him seriously. She picked up her three-year-old daughter and together with her son, dashed out of the house. Seconds later, the whole house was wrecked by a gas explosion.

Was it just chance? Or was there more to it than that? Did the little boy actually receive some kind of warning before the accident? People call this sixth sense or ESP (extra – sensory – perception). What it really means is that a person with this sixth sense can see or know something that does not come to him through the five known senses – hearing, taste, touch, sight and smell.

Not all scientists believe in ESP. Many think that human beings and animals are able to know about the world around them only through the natural powers of the five senses. However, a few scientists disagree with this thinking. They believe that it is possible for some people to know what is going to happen and to read what is in the minds of others without the use of senses. They are sure that ESP is present, even though they cannot prove it to the world.
