The poachers had finally found a buyer for their stolen goods. At the meeting with the buyer, they brought out a small duffel bag and unzipped it. Inside was a terrified one-year-old baby gorilla. The poachers had likely killed the little female's parents and captured her in the forests of the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Africa. Then they took her across the border into Rwanda, with the intention of selling her as a pet.

However, the buyer did not bring any money. He brought the cops. The poachers were arrested on the spot but the Rwandan authorities knew the orphan was still in danger. They had rescued baby gorillas before and understood that they needed to act quickly. The authorities rushed the young gorilla to the nearby headquarters of the Mountain Gorilla Veterinary Project (MGVP). The vets there realised that stre had not been given enough food of water but they were much project worried about sometimes also. The baby gorilla, which was later named Dunia, had not been getting enough touch:

"Baby gorillas simply don't survive without their mother's constant body contact," says Chris, a veterinarian. "They give up the will to live." The project's staff immediately began holding and cuddling Dunia, the little baby gorilla.

Dunia resisted attention at first, shying away from people who reached for her. "She needed contact, but there is no reason that she should trust people after what she'd been through," says Chris. "Furnans had killed her family." Three caretakers were assigned to her so she would be with a foster parent at all times.

The project's primary mission is to care for gorillas which are affected by mankind activities in the region. Along with the massive habitat destruction caused by logging and mining industries, illegal hunting threatens to drive the remaining eastern lowland gorillas to extinction.

Gorillas are vegetarians. Fortunately, Dunia had a healthy appetite for the diet she was given which included pineapples, bananas and milk formula. Although she became stronger, a month after she was, rescued her appearance revealed the psychological stress she carried inside — much of her hair had fallen out. That was a delayed reaction to the combined traumatic experiences of losing her parents and being kept with a poor diet by the poachers:

After six months of loving care, a good diet, and a comfortable home at the project's headquarters, Dunia was looking and acting like a healthy, happy young gorilla should. Dunia now ventures further from her caregivers for longer periods of time. She enjoys carefree moments of exploration out in the grassy areas of her enclosure. Eventually, the vets at the project hope to place Dunia and the other orphaned gorillas in a sanctuary and maybe release them into the wild as a group. No matter where she ends up, Dunia will never be alone again.


