I saw then the reason for his escape; the reptiles had been stacked too close to the monkeys, and a female Drill* had amused herself by putting her paws through the bars and undoing all the cages she could reach. The first one, as always happens, belonged to the Gaboon Viper. John said little, but it was tense and to the point. I agreed with him wholeheartedly for should the snake have bitten him, he would not have survived.


