



After World War II came to an end in the Philippines, I worked my way through university and in 1959, I attended a three-month community development course in Mysore City, India.

Entering the living quarters, I was dismayed to discover that my roommate was a Japanese man by the name of Kei Kiriake. Even before we were introduced to each other, I felt like a thick invisible barrier had sprung up between us.

I recalled the Japanese soldier who had looted our house. When he could not find any money, he grabbed my father and threatened to kill him with his gun. Out of desperation, I remembered that lower-rank soldiers feared the Kempetai, the Japanese military police. I told the soldier that I studied in the Japanese-run school and my teacher, Ino San was an officer in the Kempetai. "I'll go see him now," I said. The gamble worked and the soldier left our house in a huff.

I could barely tell the difference between Kei and the soldier who almost killed my father. To me, they were both Japanese and they deserved my contempt.

I expressed my hatred to Kei by wrinkling my nose to indicate that I did not like 15 his smell and I also called him "Bowlegged San".

One day, I decided to confront him. Looking at him squarely in the eyes, I said, "Can we talk?" I bluntly told him about the atrocities committed by his countrymen during their three-year occupation of the Philippines. My hate list was endless.

Throughout my whole tirade, Kei maintained a respectful silence. When I was 20 through with it, he took a bundle of pictures from his suitcase and laid them on the table. They were photos of Japanese survivors of the atomic bomb-people who were hornbly deformed by radiation and those who suffered severe burns. Many malnourished and skeletal children languished at makeshift shelters. Kei told me that he was a thirteen year old boy in Hiroshima when the bomb was dropped. 25 After hearing kei's story and seeing his photos, I found out that the Japanese had their share of misfortures too. I realised that there are no victors in war, only victims.

The icy atmosphere in our room started to thaw. One day while walking to catch a bus, Kei and I were caught by a heavy downpour. "You know, when I was a kid, I loved to run in the rain," I said.

"Me too!" Kei replied. Soon, we found ourselves laughing and running through the rain to the bus stop. From then on, Kei and I got along better. Just before the course ended, I felt that my blinding hatred for the Japanese people had disappeared. The vindictiveness, the prejudice and the other "wounds of war" that I had carried for years were gone.

Lek's work as a tour guide often took her to the local elephant shows where the domesticated elephants were chained and taunted by their keepers when performing. They were also confined in pens that were too small for them to move about and Lek hoped to get a place for them to roam freely in a safe and secure environment instead.

One day, Lek saw a man dragging a baby elephant down a crowed street, asking tourists to pay for a bunch of bananas to feed it. It was hard to ignore the scare on the elephant's legs, an indication that it was probably recently tortured. One could also tell that the man had most likely not spent any money earned on the weak looking elephant. It was the last straw for Lek. She spotted a large piece of discarged 25 cardboard, picked it up and furiously wrote a message that read: "Please do not support the abuse of this baby elephant". Holding the cardboard with the message high up, she planted herself in clear view near the elephant. Everyone stayed clear and the elephant's owner was outraged. He smashed the sign with his fist and knocked Lek to the ground. She was rushed to the hospital with a broken jaw. 30

Through the persistent use of the media and frequent discussions with conservation group, she managed gradually to increase people's attention to the plight of the elephant. To fulfil her dream of getting a safe haven for the elephant, she sold her house, her car and everything else that she owned.

Finally, in 1996, Lek opened the Elephant Nature Park. Within a few months, she managed to save nearly thirty elephants. Since then, the Elephant Nature Park has received numerous awards from various institutions and Lek was named 'Asian Hero of the Year' by Time Magazine in 2005.

- 78) The sentence is "To fulfil her dream of getting a safe haven for the elephant, she sold her house, her car and everything else that she owned".
- 79)Through the persistent use of the media and frequent discussions with conservation groups, Lek increased public awareness to the issue of elephant abuse.
- 80)In 1996, Lek opened the Elephant Nature Park which has received numerous awards from various institutions and Lek was named "Asian Hero of the Year" by Time Magazine in 2005.
