





I was about to collapse as I trudged onward under the blinding, ferocious sun. It was the second day of our journey across China's vast Taklimakan Desert but my strength was already fading. Centuries ago, rivers from the mountains flowed to the Taklimakan desert. 20 The people of the desert managed to make use of the water from these rivers to farm in the desert. Though the rivers had since dried up, some hidden water was still there. The only clues were patches of white salt crust on the sand. However, my map did not show them nor could the local tribesmen tell us where they might be. They were the desert's best-kept secret. Luckily, before sunset, we saw salt crust patches and 25 decided to camp there for the night. The tribesmen started digging and after a while, beckoned us over. At the bottom of the almost six-foot deep hole, a pool of water was gradually seeping through the dark, moist sand. Standing in the hole, a tribesman scooped some water into his hands and sipped it. That night, the camels drank.
