

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Ron stood in his small boat and pulled it upstream with a long bamboo pole. The Onive River was shallow and moved swiftly against him. He was unafraid of the water snakes as he was of the crocodiles in the river.

A rosewood cutter, whom Ron knew, had been robbed of his harvest by an organised gang. One of the thugs told him, "There are thirty of us, one you." Another two men were decapitated with an axe over a timber dispute a few days ago.

The old folks often spoke of the fady, the taboos that had protected the rainforest for centuries. So, it came as no surprise when Ron heard anxious talks among the timber thieves whenever a tree crushed a skull. Comments like "We have angered our ancestors. They are punishing us." were often heard.

Thus, the old folks often lectured Ron about his disrespect for the sacred turf. "Fine," he told them. "Try feeding the trees to your family." Ron had not given up hope for a better life and job. He was optimistic about the prospect of having a new government in power, sensing the transformation that was taking place in the country. In time to come, he was certain that all these uncertainties would soon come to an end and the situation would change for the better.


