Saliva keeps our mouth moist and softens our food when we masticate. Without it, we would have a hard time talking. We would find it even harder to swallow. For some animals, however, it works better after it has left the mouth. These animals are expert at surviving because they are expert spitters.

One such animal is the llama. Llamas seem to like their personal space. A llama that feels threatened or annoyed will ultimately spit slimy gobs at an intruder as a sign to leave it alone. Sometimes they even spit on each other to steal food! This trick usually works because the spit from the llama includes food from its stomach and this can be really smelly. When a llama spits on another animal, the animal would normally lose its appetite and walk away, hence leaving its food behind.

The archer fish is also a very skilful spitter. This fish is like a submarine with a loaded weapon. It takes aim and spits jets of water at insects and other small creatures to knock them down into the water so that they could be easily consumed in fast gulps. In order to create such a forceful stream of water, an archer fish closes its gills and uses its tongue to form a tube in its mouth. Then the fish sticks its snout out of the water and aims at its target.

Another animal that is well-known for its expert aim is the spitting cobras which are feared not only by other animals but also by human beings. These fearsome creatures have the ability to spray poisonous venom from their fangs when they are threatened so as to protect themselves. It is also a mechanism in which they use to get their prey. Scientists believe that these snakes actually aim for the eyes of their victims! When the spitting cobra's venom gets into the eyes of an animal, the venom causes terrible pain and even blindness in the victim, thus allowing the snake to escape or to consume it.

Some other animals depend on saliva not for survival but for improving the quality of life, using the fluid for functions varying from grooming and cleansing to nest-building. Saliva also increases the potential of evaporation and cooling for panting animals.
