Junior Reading Ambassador

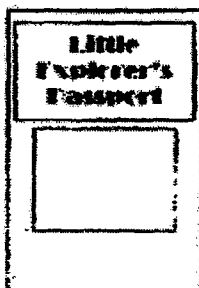


Hi Everyone! ☺

"It's going to get chilly. Better get moving! The camp is still more than three kilometres downhill," I told myself. It had been eighteen years since I first came to Alaska. Still, even a bright summer day could mean trouble.

As I slung my backpack onto my shoulders, a large Arctic mosquito thudded against my cheeks. There had been a few of them through the day but it was early in the season – the ice had melted just two weeks before and I had scarcely noticed them. As I walked down the ridge, the last gentle wind faded and they were on me. Rising in clouds from the soggy *tundra, the insects pelted against my face. I reached in my pocket for the repellent and came up empty. I was flailing away, nailing five or six at a whack but there were a couple of thousands mobbing me. They were diving in nose-first and filling themselves up, jabbing me right through my clothes, dozens at a time. Years of Alaskan experience had taught me what to do in a situation like this. I turned up my collar, pulled my backpack straps tight and ran like the wind.

When I saw my tent, I was still going strong. So were the bugs. I had left the first swarm behind somewhere up the mountain but there were more waiting every step of the way and they trailed me in a whining veil. Each time I slowed, the mass mugging resumed. Pausing just long enough to unzip the door of the tent, I dived through to safety. It took me fifteen minutes to hunt down the hundred or so that made it inside with me.

After I had cornered the last one, I tried to relax. My hands and neck were smeared with blood and every bit of exposed skin had broken out in red itchy lumps. Outside, the insistent wail was nearly deafening. Mosquitoes settled over the tent, pattering on the nylon like rain. Feeling hungry, I settled for the cereal bars in my pack and a few sips of water. As I ate, the insects clustered on the tent's windows screens, snouts probing hopefully through the mesh. Not until later that night, when a cold rain swept in and scattered the mob, did I stick my own itching nose outside again.

*tundra - A treeless area beyond the timberline in high-latitude regions, having a permanently frozen subsoil and supporting low-growing vegetation such as lichens, mosses, and shrubs.

The mosquito season in this part of Alaska is relatively short, ten weeks at most but it is savage by any standard. I have been pestered in tropical Asia, 30 mauled in the woods of England and chomped in the mangrove swamps of Mexico. No bugs I ever encountered prepared me for the Arctic mosquito.

At their worst, there are millions per square kilometre, rising in huge numbers to engulf any unfortunate mammal including humans. Local legend has it that an animal or human caught in one of those bug storms can be sucked dry. 35 Luckily, the worst infestations do not last for more than a month or so.

Bloodthirsty though they are, the big Arctic mosquitoes are frail creatures. They spend most of their brief lives down under leaves. A still evening is perfect. Then things can turn ugly in a hurry.

In Arctic Alaska, there are people, like my friend Howie Kantner, who 40 show you it is all in the mind. While I had applied repellent all over my body and waved a hand to keep the bugs out of my face, Howie gently brushed the insects away. Bare-chested. No repellent. His back looked as if it was covered with living grey fur. He told me, "If you don't think about them, they won't bother you. They're part of the country." 45

Howie's casual approach may explain why he does not weigh more than sixty kilogrammes. He has a point, though. If you spend summers in Northern Alaska, mosquitoes are a simple fact of existence like rain. Such facts – some hard, some beautiful, pure in their simplicity. That is the lure of this place. Even after eighteen years, the thrill has not faded. Far beyond the nearest road, no one 50 would claim that life is easy. However, I would not have it any other way.
