

We were ten teenagers on a month-long service mission to repair the homes of the underprivileged living in the Himalayan mountains. The area appeared to contradict itself, for it held so much magnificence yet housed so much poverty. We's saw ourselves as being able to serve those in need but not benefiting from it.

We drove our green van through the mountainous landscape and pulled 5 up alongside Raj's house. As the doors opened, we poured out with hammers in hand, and prepared to start our usual routine. We interchanged jobs as we basked in the sun. Some of us painted the windows while others stained the deck or mended the roof. We passed the time with private jokes and songs. Despite the monotony of painting window after window, we truly enjoyed ourselves. All the while, Raj, a 10 retiree, sat in a lawn chair observing us with a cane in hand to support himself in case he needed to get up.

As the clock neared noon, we took our lunch break in the shelter of a small tree in Raj's front yard. Dave, our facilitator, planted Raj's chair beside us and announced that since he was to assist in any way possible. Raj would lead us in a 15 before-meal prayer. He saw our weary faces and heard the growls, from our stomachs. He kept it short and we soon began digging into our food.

"Let me tell you a story...," he then started. From the pit of his modest heart, he began to unravel his eighty-some-odd years for us. He was a school teacher who had a dog named Spikey. He told of old hunting expeditions in the 20 mountains where his life was almost lost to a bear. He also shared about the killing of rattlesnakes.

Then his eyes just wandered off as if he was no longer talking for our benefit, but more for his own. He described that day his dog died, as heavy tears rolled down his weathered cheeks and he clasped the end of his cane. He recalled 25 her faithfulness to the end as with one last thump of the tail, looking up at him, Spikey passed on. He remembered his wife gazing up at him much the same way seconds before her death.

He always tenderly called his wife 'Mama'. He told of how she had always stayed up until the wee hours of the morning to bake bread for him while he, often 30 exhausted from a long day of teaching or hunting, would retire to bed. "Why hadn't I taken the extra time to stay up with her?" he said in a distant voice as his eyes gazed beyond us. "Why couldn't I do so? Why?"

I remembered how intensely those words rang inside me. Here was a man brimming with wisdom and reflections on his life, telling me to make the most of, 35 mine, to take the extra time with those I love: I was motivated. I was mesmerised by this amazing old man whom I had thought I was helping. Raj's house was not a workplace at all. It was a classroom.
