Beneficiaries' Stories

Nick Tan is a beneficiary of The School Lunch Money Fund (TSLMF). The \$95 a month he receives covers some of his school-related expenses.

Two years ago, he was a rebellious boy who often loitered on the streets. Today, Nick, 14, is one of the top students in his class and spends his free time playing badminton.

Nick's 50-year-old mother is disabled. His father, 52, works as a bus driver. His salary is hardly enough for the family of six, which includes Nick's three young sisters.

The monthly allowance from TSLMF helps the family to make ends meet. "It assists us with our expenses," said Nick's mother, Madam Cheng.

Nick said that the money pays for necessities like food and his transportation to school. "I don't have to worry very much and can concentrate on my studies.... In future, I would like to help others as others have helped me."

This is the story of Elicia binte Basir, told in her own words.

Before, life was not as easy as now. My mom had to take care of us on her own. She would sacrifice her own needs and wants in order to ensure we received an education. She also tried to give us what we wanted. Though she gave us the 'green light' to indulge occasionally in our wants, my siblings and I always tried hard to save money because we knew how hard it was for our mother.

The situation deteriorated when my mom started having severe headaches, stomach aches and frequent vomiting. We were worried and our studies were affected. She was diagnosed with cancer and could not go out to work. Nor could she be at home. I visited her every day at the hospital. I would go from home to school, from school to the hospital, and then back home at night. This cycle continued till she was finally discharged.

It was a crucial year for me as I had major exams in secondary school. I used whatever time I had at the hospital and at home to study *furiously*.

The School Lunch Money Fund (TSLMF) came into our lives and aided us financially and emotionally. Our problems were not all solved but the burden was lightened. We saw a ray of light in the midst of the darkened paths. We were motivated to work harder and thankfully, we achieved satisfactory results. After my mom was healed, the TSLMF assisted to reduce her worries.

Five-year-old Jocelyn Rojas spent all day riding happily outside her grandmother's apartment building. Her mother, Jaimee, kept her eye on the little girl from a window.

At about 4 p.m., Jocelyn rode around the corner of the building and disappeared.

"I took my eyes off her for five minutes, and she was gone," says Jaimee. The frantic mother called out to her daughter as she scoured the complex. "I knew something was wrong," she recalled, especially when she saw that Jocelyn's bike was still there and found an old credit card her daughter had been playing with abandoned near the bike racks. Jaimee called the police.

A short time later, police officers and firefighters searched the suburban neigbourhood, blockading streets and alleys. The authorities handed out a photo of the blond, pixie-faced girl with a gap-toothed grin wearing thick-framed classes. In all, at least 100 people assisted in the search for the missing girl.

Temar Boggs, 15, was moving a couch into the apartment of his elderly neighbour with some friends, when one searcher approached him and asked if he had seen Jocelyn. None of them had seen her.

A little bit later, Temar and his friends walked over to Jocelyn's block to check out the situation when he noticed the police still waiting around the house.

By 6:30 p.m., Jocelyn had been missing for more than two hours. The authorities were getting worried as the sun was setting and that would make the search more difficult. Also, the longer they took, the chances of finding her would be diminished further.

Again, Temar was approached with a photo of the little girl. At that moment, he felt an intense emotion he had never experienced before. He felt that he was going to find her. He hastily turned to one of his friends and said, "Hey, can I borrow your bike?"

As he sped away on the borrowed BMX, his friend Chris, rode alongside him. The boys searched frantically, without a plan, simply keeping an eye out as they pedalled past the lush lawns of the wealthy neighbourhood.

Then, Temar spotted a maroon car veering down a side street and looping back, as if the driver was unfamiliar with the neighbourhood. He whizzed after it. The car suddenly made an abrupt U-turn when it reached the top of a hill - a group of police officers and firefighters had congregated there. The car passed the boys as it circled back down the hill. Temar made eye contact with the man behind the wheel, and noticed a tiny blond girl in the passenger seat.

Temar instantly knew it was her. The boys chased the car. For several minutes, the driver kept moving, slowly winding his way through the neighbourhood.

Finally, the driver stopped at a curb several hundred metres away, opened the passenger-side door for Jocelyn to slip out, and then sped away. The boys had found Jocelyn.

After being returned to her mother's waiting embrace, Jocelyn was taken to the police headquarters and questioned. She told the police that the kidnapper had driven his car up to her and chatted pleasantly with her about her bicycle. Then, she said he leaped across the front seat and grabbed her neck, forcing her into the car. A police report later identified the 63-year-old child-abductor.
