

Meet Warren Faidley, an American extreme weather journalist, storm and disaster survival
expert, photographer, and cinematographer.
Faidley was the storm chaser who created a professional (51)
solely from pursuing severe weather like tornadoes, hurricanes and other natural
(52) He would chase these storms anywhere and anytime and capture
these events (53) film.
Faidley's interest in storm chasing can be (54) back to his
childhood when he spent his time riding his bicycle into the dust devils. His childhood
"chases" nearly killed him after he was swept (55) by a flash flood. His
professional career was launched after he took a photograph of lightning
(56) a light pole in an oil and gasoline tank farm in Arizona. The image
was (57) in a magazine which earned him the title of "Storm Chaser".
One of the biggest storms he has ever chased was Hurricane Andrew in August
1992. Andrew hit South Florida (58) winds of 260 kilometres per hour
but Faidley found it both exciting and frightening to be in the (59) of a
"category 5" storm, the strongest of all hurricanes.
He had to be very careful because the rain hit him so hard that it
