

My graduation speech received thunderous applause. Although I had forgotten what I said that night, the sight of my parents and siblings seated in the front row was an image that I would never forget. Seeing me in my graduation gown, their work-weary faces beamed with pride. My achievement was possible because of their love and support.

My siblings never had a real childhood. Being children of farmers, they had to help out on the farm. This was to make sure the family made enough money to pay for the rental of the land on which we grew our crops. Mother and Father worked hard too. The only way out of our poverty was education, which we sought feverishly. However, for my siblings, it was futile. Inevitably, each of them had to leave school and bear his share of the farm work in order for our family to survive. Eventually, the family pinned all their hopes on me, the youngest. While my siblings toiled away in the sun, I was the lucky one who could go to school. They never once complained that they had been deprived of the same opportunity.

My passion for learning became more intense when I realised what a struggle it was for my parents and siblings to keep me in school. Many a time, they had to skip meals to pay for my school fees. Determined to make my family proud, the cramped dingy classroom became a battleground where I fought to stay on top of my class: 1" out-read, out-figured, and out-spelled my classmates who mocked my poverty, calling 30 me "the boy with eyes on his back" - the "eyes" being the perpetual holes in my shirt.

Years later, I was going to finally graduate as the top student in my university. My family saw my success as their triumph. One by one, they came to me the week before my graduation ceremony with crumpled dollar notes and coins, muttering, "Here, Tim, this is for your graduation gown." That meant a lot to me. Their thoughtful gesture allowed me to purchase my graduation gown, the very first brand new attire that I owned. I looked forward to donning it at my graduation ceremony.

On my graduation day, my heart raced as I put on my gown before making my way to the podium. I had been carefully rehearsing my speech for many weeks. However, when I saw my family in the audience, I was overwhelmed with emotion. I realised in that moment that it was now my turn to repay them for all the sacrifices that they had made.
