

In the early days, the Singapore River was a major trading centre in Singapore. This led to the rapid growth of the island. Unfortunately, the river also suffered problems with congestion and heavy pollution over the years.

In 1977, the Ministry of Environment began the task of cleaning up Singapore River. Works were undertaken to redevelop Singapore River and this included the construction of a 6km long promenade along both banks of the waterfront.



Today, Singapore River has changed a lot. Transformed from a working waterway to an attractive waterfront environment for housing, recreation, entertainment and commercial new developments, the Singapore River is now more vibrant than ever. Conserved


