I was only three days into a graduate year in England when I was dragging my backpack and suitcase through the London Underground. I was also crying uncontrollably with a heavy heart. As I struggled to get the suitcase up another flight of steps, I was struggling to understand how my life had fallen apart ever since I left America.

The day before, my uncle had informed me that I was never to speak to any of his family members again. Earlier,-I had made a senseless comment. It was never meant to hurt my aunt's feelings but it did. I spent the evening in a telephone booth, weeping as I spoke to a family friend who lived in England.

The foolish part was that I did not immediately call my parents. As a 22-year-old who had been raised to respect and trust adults, I believed my uncle and aunt when they said I had ruined the relationship between themselves and my family. Today, as a 38-year-old, I know this was ridiculous. Their reaction was all out of proportion. However at that time, it was as if I had razed everything my family had built.

When I left the telephone booth, I went back to a silent house with three closed bedroom doors. I did not sleep. In the morning, I heard my uncle and aunt get up and leave. They did not knock on my door to say a quick goodbye. They were never that cold towards me. When it was quiet, I wrote a note of apology and left it in my uncle's bedroom. I dragged my suitcase to the train station. When I arrived at London, I had to take the subway to get to my family friend's house.

I was familiar with the subway but at that time, it was a tube of endless white tiles. I was exhausted. Worst of all, no lifts were working. Crying yet again, I tried to lift my suitcase up the stairs.

Suddenly in my slog there were hands. No one said anything but each time I faced another set of steps, a hand would grip the suitcase handle and lift it. At the top of the steps, the hand would let go and I would pull the suitcase to the next set. And just as I was about to struggle again, another hand would appear.

It happened several times. I never looked up because I could not stop crying. I do remember thinking through the haze of grief that each hand looked different, that many different people helped me without asking or saying anything. They just helped, right up to the top of the last flight of stairs. I could not look up. I was not able to say a word of thanks.

I went on to have an outstanding year studying in England. I also made some friendships that continue to sustain me. However, that was the last time I saw or spoke to my uncle or aunt. Yet when I think about my harrowing story in 1998, I remember vividly those strangers' hands. They were there when I needed them and even now, they pull me through the sadness of that memory. I think of them as I ride the subway in Washington today. I watch the commuters and tourists surge by intently, just in case someone needs a hand desperately.
