



The bus for Yichang pulled out of Beijing's Jinjiadun Station trailing a blue cloud of burning oil, and thirty minutes later we were speeding down an open I was sitting near the driver, and I leaned forward to check the highway. speedometer. It was not working - the needle sat limply at zero. It was clear that we were going very fast, in fact too fast, but the driver simply patted back a yawn. | 5

We were entering a town with a posted speed limit of 50 km/h. Rather than slowing down, the driver sounded the horn repeatedly to warn pedestrians, vehicles and animals to get out of his way. The horn button was broken. To use it, he held two exposed wires together - taking both hands off the wheel each time.

After two hours, we had braked twice abruptly enough to push my upper torso into the seat in front of me, swerved at the last second to avoid an oncoming truck, passed on a blind curve, forced an oncoming van off the road and skidded on a gravel shoulder, scraping the guard rail. I left the bus unscathed but newspaper headlines for the month of October showed that passengers on 15 other buses across Asia were not so fortunate.

The details might vary but the stories behind these and the hundreds of other Asian bus accidents last year had certain common denominators: overworked, exhausted drivers racing each other to pick up passengers and revenue, twisting two-lane mountain roads with inadequate guard rails, incompetent drivers and unsafe vehicles placed on the road by corrupt officials.

It was a recipe for disaster especially so for the millions of us who depended on buses for transportation nearly every day of our lives. Yet one of the difficulties in coping with this deadly problem was that there was no solid information about exactly how serious it was. However, studies had shown that the driver was the single most lethal ingredient in this recipe for disaster. "Inadequate training or no training is a major problem," said an official. A study showed that driver error was the major cause of bus accidents.
